## FUNERAL HELD FOR PATRIARCH

Moscow, April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—The funeral of the Most Rev. Dr. Tikhon, first patriarch of the Russian orthodox church since Peter the Great and the last great figure of Imperial Russia, took place yesterday. With imposing ceremony the casket containing the body was placed under the concrete floor of the Donskoy monastery, to which he was banished in 1922 by the civil authorities after 15 months imprisonment.

Almost the entire clergy of Moscow and neighboring cities, including five metropolitan archbishops participated in the majestic slavonic liturgy which accompanied the burial.

## FORD LINKS PLANTS WITH PLANE CARRIERS

Detroit, Mich., April 13.—(By Associated Press.)—The Ford Motor company today inaugurated what is said to be the first commercial air line to be established in the United States, when the "Maiden Dearborn," an all-metal monoplane of the "air pullman" type, hopped off from Ford airport, Dearborn, at 9:24 a. m. with a cargo of company mail and express for the Ford plant at Hegewisch, Ill., near Chicago.

The plane, piloted by Eddie Hamilton, a former royal air service flyer, is one of two duralumin planes to form the nucleus of an air service to link the Ford com-

pany here with its plants at Chicago, St. Louis, Mo., St. Paul, Minn., and Iron Mountain, Mich. The second plane will receive its first test soon.

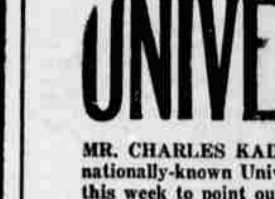
