PRUNE GROWERS NAME OFFICERS WILL BUY PLANT

Dallas, Apr. 14.—The Polk County Co-operative Prune Growers held their annual meeting Monday afternoon in Dallas and elected a board of directors to handle affairs during the ensuing year.

Five of the old board of directors were re-elected and two new ones selected, taking the place of Dr. M. Hayter and W. M. Elliott, who withdrew from the association. The new directors are G. A. Schroeder and Fred R. Elliott. Re-elected directors are H. S. Dutz, Ira C. Powell, T. J. Alisp Henry Voth and E. J. Himes. The board will meet on April 22 to organize for the year and elect officers.

The purpose of the plant, upon which the local holds an option, was authorized. This is the plant of the old Oregon Growers.

Four members of the association exercised their withdrawal privilege. They have been given the right to sign up again if they so desire before the 1925 crop is harvested.

The financial report of the local association showed that the cost of handling the prunes locally would be about .8 of a cent this year. The growers here have received 4 1/2 cents a pound to date.

quash the indictments, which charges assault and battery with intent to kill, assault and battery with intent to rape, malicious mayhem, kidnapping and conspiracy to commit a felony.

Miss Oberholtzer had been unconscious for two weeks preceding her death.

Miss Oberholtzer was widely known in public school circles throughout Indiana. She had served as secretary-treasurer of the Young People's Reading Circle of Indiana, an organization connected with the public school system, and also was formerly employed in the office of the state superintendent of public instruction.

Accomplices Held. Earl Kinck and Earl Gentry, alleged to have been companions of Stephenson, are under indictment with him on the charge of conspiracy to commit a felony.

According to members of the girl's family, Miss Oberholtzer told them she went to Stephenson's home in the Butler College district, near her own home, on Sunday evening, March 15. Stephenson, who was prominent in republican politics and active in the successful campaign of Governor Jackson for the nomination and election, had called her on what she said was an important matter. Miss Oberholtzer is said to have told her parents.

Arriving at Stephenson's home, according to her parents, she said she was forced to drink some liquor. Following the drinking, members of the family say, she told them she was taken on train to Hammond, Ind., and was attacked in a hotel room there.

Drank Poison. On March 16, Miss Oberholtzer said she was permitted to leave the hotel in order to purchase a hat, as she had left her home bare-headed. According to the story, she purchased and took poison and returned to the hotel, tell Stephenson and his companions of her act. She then was placed in an automobile and returned to Indianapolis, arriving in this city Monday evening. Her family declares she was not returned to her home until Tuesday, March 17, when a man left her at the house during their absence. He is said to have informed a neighbor that



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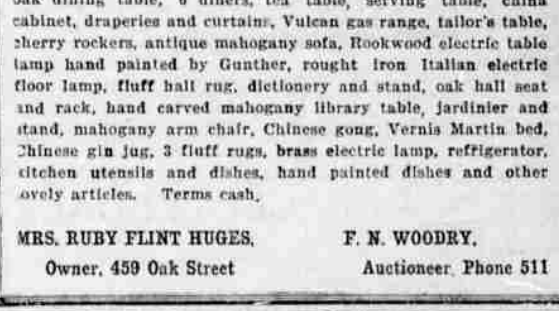
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
