

ELWOOD HAYNES FATHER OF AUTO VICTIM OF FLU

Kokomo, Ind., April 14.—Elwood Haynes, 68, who in 1894 invented the "horseless" carriage, is dead at his home here, a victim of influenza. Mr. Haynes, who had never fully recovered from a previous attack of the disease was ill but a few days. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

Mr. Haynes suffered an attack of influenza while on a trip through the southern states and on the advice of a physician whom he had consulted, he returned home. Heart disease, with which he long has been afflicted, also contributed to his death.

Few friends knew of the serious illness of the pioneer automobile manufacturer who also gained international reputation as a scientist and metallurgist and his death last night was a shock to all that knew him. His widow, son and daughter were at his bedside when death came.

PRINCE IS GIVEN NOISY FAREWELL

Accra, Gold Coast, West Africa, April 14.—(By Associated Press.)—The Prince of Wales, on board the battle cruiser Repulse, left here today for Nigeria. He was given a great send-off by the local inhabitants and the native chiefs. Huge crowds were assembled alongside the highway at strategic points on the prince's route to the pier, where he embarked. The chiefs with their retinues had the best positions for seeing the royal visitor.

The prince walked the last hundred yards to the dock where he boarded a launch for the Repulse. A heavy swell was running and scores of surfboats, half submerged in the rough water, bobbed up and down offshore, their occupants yelling greetings to the departing guest. Hundreds of natives waded waist deep into the water, and lining up as though on parade, watched the launch leave the quay for the battle cruiser.

SHEPHERD PROBE SHIFTS TO TEXAS

Chicago, April 14.—Investigation of the death of Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, whose exhumed body was found to contain mercury poison, has shifted temporarily to Galveston, Texas, from where in 1909 a physician was summoned to attend her in Bayview, Texas, when she was attacked by her final illness.

Galveston authorities have been asked to question Dr. William C. Fleher, who was practicing there in 1909, if he attended Mrs. McClintock. Physicians who attended her after she returned to Chicago to die have said they prescribed no mercury.

The coroner's jury later this week will resume its inquiry into the death of William McClintock, so, of Mrs. McClintock, as the final step preceding the arraignment of William D. Shepherd, his foster father on a charge of killing him with typhoid germs.

GUARDS AROUND HOME OF GOVERNOR RELIEVED

Cheyenne, Wyo., April 14.—Guards who have been patrolling the vicinity of the executive mansion of Governor Nellie T. Ross have been withdrawn, it developed last night, but the reason for their vigil during the last few days and nights remained a mystery.

M. C. Wachtel, state law enforcement commissioner, at whose orders the guards were placed, declared that the espionage that had aroused the curiosity of all Cheyenne would cease and the guards be taken away because a "new lead" had been found and "we propose to run it down."

What the new lead was or may be is evidently a profound secret.

When Miss Trask was informed of the druggist's mistake she said she had intended to use the medicine last night but that she felt as though she should wait until morning.

PRINCE IS BUSY AT CEREMONIES

Accra, Gold Coast, West Africa, April 14.—(By Associated Press.)—After a busy Sunday the Prince of Wales started another day of ceremonies by receiving an address from the legislative council which was read by the senior African member of the body. This member later presented the prince a huge elephant tusk.

Having received the Gold Coast legislators, the prince went to the polo grounds where crowds had gathered since dawn for the royal reception of native chiefs from the central province of the colony. The road was packed with masses of black humanity yelling welcome to the royal visitor while the polo ground itself presented a rare picture of tropical color with forty chiefs and their retinues grouped in a great semicircle under gorgeous canopies with a background of trees and the sea.
