

KAY SAYS DRIVE FOR LINEN MILL SURE TO GO OVER

"I predict that this proposition will go over, and that this state is destined to come into its own," said Tom Kay, prominent Salem business man and state treasurer, in a speech before the Salem Kiwanis club Tuesday night. "Once this mill is successfully established, I believe that linen manufacturers will come to the Willamette valley from all parts of North America, and even Europe, in order to take advantage of the superior quality of flax grown here and to escape the enormous duty imposed by the United States government upon imported linen. Eventually there will be several million men and women in the Willamette valley, instead of several hundred thousand, as at present, furnishing a steady market right here at home for the products of our farmers and our merchants."

Mr. Kay gave one of the clearest explanations of the situation as regards the finances of the project that has been given in public since the movement first got underway. There will be \$600,000 of preferred stock sold, he stated, of which Dominion Linens will purchase \$50,000 worth. There will also be \$40,000 of common stock sold, of which Dominion Linens will retain one-fourth, or \$10,000 worth. Voting power will be in the common stock. The preferred stock will pay 7 per cent from the start and may be retired at the discretion of the voters whenever they find themselves able to retire it. At time of retirement of the preferred stock a 5 per cent premium must be paid, over and above the 7 per cent which the stock draws anyway. Preferred stock sells at \$100 a share, common stock at \$10 a share. Any buyer is entitled to purchase one share of common stock for every two shares of preferred stock.

The Willamette infield was composed of Herman, first base; Poling, second base; Faenacht, shortstop, and Isham, third base. Towner occupied the catcher's box. The outfield consisted of Nakana, Chapman and Kalahan.

The second game on the Willamette schedule is with Monmouth normal school Friday afternoon school Friday afternoon. The game will be played on the Willamette field.

CHINESE EGGS HATCH EN ROUTE; SUIT FILED

San Francisco, Cal., April 15.—The Hemingway Produce company filed suit in the federal court yesterday to recover \$24,485 from the United States shipping board emergency fleet, the United States government and the Pacific Mail Steamship company. The amount represents the value of 3000 cases of Chinese eggs which the Hemingway company claims were stored too close to the engines of the steamship President Taft, on which they arrived from Shanghai. The result was that most of them hatched out into chicks and the rest were spoiled.

KIDNAPED AMERICAN FREED

Washington, April 15.—George E. Fertner, an American citizen employed by the Penn Mexico Fuel company and abducted on April 6 by Mexican bandits near Tuxpan, has been rescued by Mexican federal soldiers.

A report to the state department from Charles Day, American consul at Tampico, telling of Fertner's return, said that in the fight between the federal and bandit forces one bandit was killed and the leader captured and executed.

He, in turn, preferred to come to the new country, to remaining in Hungary, even if his wife was there, so he left her with her mother and now is seeking a divorce.

The papers were filed yesterday in circuit court. Sellberger declares that all he says in his divorce complaint may be verified by the official records in Hungary.

Cooper, Americans from Milwaukee, were kidnaped Saturday while travelling by automobile from Lobo Quilla to San Francisco, Conchos, but that they had been released and are en route to El Paso.

A bullet shattered the windshield of the automobile when the party was accosted and flying glass caused injuries to Mr. Reynolds' head and scratched Mrs. Cooper's face.

Sunday morning, when the chauffeur and Mr. Reynolds, who were sent to secure ransom money, failed to return, the kidnaping party, made up of three men with horses, became frightened and released Mrs. Reynolds and Mr. and Mrs. Cooper.

Alex and Harry Goldstein, brothers, who are under sentence in the state penitentiary, are expected to return to the prison today after having been allowed by Governor Pierce to spend the Jewish Passover week at their homes in Portland. The two were sentenced to serve two and a half years in the penitentiary for receiving stolen goods in Portland. Harry Goldstein was given a day's leave of absence about two weeks ago so that he might attend the christening of a newly-arrived babe at his home in Portland.

Governor Pierce explained today that while the Goldsteins and their friends have guaranteed that the two will return to the state prison, the release for the week is on his own responsibility. The governor said the attorney general had ruled that the state executive has authority to grant such leaves of absence and that it is in the nature of a reprieve.
