

ANNUAL CONCERT OF WILLAMETTE CLUB TONIGHT

The annual Salem concert of the Willamette university glee club, and the last concert of the club's season, will be given tonight at Waller hall on the Willamette campus. The program includes seven songs by the club as a whole, exclusive of encores and a number of vocal and instrumental solos and humorous skits. The program will begin with "Jolly Students," a facetious song of college life, and end with "Old Historic Temple," a Willamette classic which Willamette students honor by rising when it is sung.

The glee club has recently returned from a two weeks' tour to western Washington, where it sang before 14 different audiences, and before the microphone at the Oregonian radio tower.

At present the club is composed of 19 men of the university, besides the accompanist and reader. It is under the direction of Professor E. W. Hobson of the Willamette school of music. 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HOME RUN SLUGGERS NUMEROUS THIS YEAR

Chicago, April 17.—The slugger's race for home run honors which opened briskly on the first day of the major league season, has developed an average of ten homers a day without the assistance of Babe Ruth, and has received talk of the "rabbit" ball.

The American league parks have seen twice as many homers as the National, but Charles ("Gabby") Hartnett, Chicago Cubs catcher, leads the field of twenty-five with a record of three to date.

The twenty home runs of the American league are divided among 18 players, while there are seven swatsmen in the National league who have accounted for ten circuit clouts in the older circuit.

FIVE LOSE LIVES IN COOS BAY FIRE

Marshfield, Or., April 17.—Five persons are believed to have lost their lives here early today when fire destroyed a two-story frame building, the second floor of which was occupied by four families.

The charred remains of one, believed to be H. H. Hoppe, a painter, was found. His wife and three children are believed to have been burned. Other occupants of the building escaped through upper windows. Mrs. Henry Hegdahl and her mother, Mrs. Watson, were injured when they leaped from the window. Mrs. Watson is in a critical condition.

The lower floor of the building housed business concerns, including the Broadway cafe, where the blaze is believed to have started. The Marshfield grocery store was completely destroyed and the Goring Furniture company suffered heavy loss. The total loss was estimated at \$50,000.
