

CRAWFORD SAYS FLAX GOOD CROP FOR FARMERS HERE

Taking up the flax industry from the standpoint of the farmer, Robert Crawford, flax expert at the Oregon state penitentiary, Thursday declared that flax is a more profitable crop to grow than wheat, oats, or any similar crop. He spoke before the Marion-Polk County Realtors' association at their weekly luncheon at noon, his subject being, "Does Flax Growing Pay the Farmer?"

Crawford estimated that flax can be grown on ordinary soil, under ordinary conditions, with an expenditure of \$25 an acre for everything. The amount includes an estimate of \$15 an acre for hand pulling, although it can be pulled, if enough acreage is available by machinery for \$8 an acre, he stated.

He estimated a minimum of two tons of flax produced to the acre, with a sale price of \$25 a ton, making the crop worth \$75 an acre, and leaving a profit larger than the profit derived from any similar crop. "With the proper care three tons to the acre could be produced very readily," Crawford contended. "I don't know of any other crop that can be put in annually and produce those returns." He warned against allowing weeds to grow in the flax, stating that the flax plant cannot handle flax which contains weeds.

"Much of good land in the Willamette valley will produce wheat, but not flax," said Crawford. The type of land to which he referred was heavy much soil. Any other soil in the valley can be used for growing flax, he said.

CHAPMAN GIVEN MORE TIME TO FILE APPEAL

Portland, Conn., April 17.—Gerald Chapman's counsel have been granted an extension of ten days by Judge Newell Jennings for the filing of the request for a finding by the judge and the submission of a draft for the proposed finding, which are the next steps in Chapman's appeal to the supreme court from the conviction in the superior court.

Chapman was found guilty of murder and was sentenced to hang on June 25.

SALT LAKE FIREMEN THREATEN WALK OUT

Salt Lake City, Utah, April 17.—Members of the city commission will meet with Mayor C. C. Neelken today to consider the blanket resignation of 91 Salt Lake firemen effective April 21, which was tendered yesterday when the commission, after a two weeks' hearing failed to oust Fire Chief William H. Bywater, despite a petition signed by 100 fire fighters asking his removal.

The firemen in their petition accused their chief of arbitrary conduct. If the resignation is accepted, Salt Lake's regular fire fighting force after next Tuesday will consist of seven officials and less than a half dozen firemen, augmented by about 36 recruits, who have been trained intensively for the last three weeks in anticipation of the resignation.
