

FIRE WARDENS TO CONFER HERE EARLY IN MAY

The annual fire wardens' conference will be held at the state house Monday and Tuesday, May 4 and 5, State Forester F. A. Elliott announced today. All of the district wardens in the employ of the forestry department and all law enforcement men who hold commissions, 40 in number, will attend. Invitations have been sent to many men throughout the northwest and Canada who are interested in forestry and lumbering.

The conference this year will be of especial interest because of several changes made in the forestry laws by the 1925 legislature. Tuesday afternoon will be devoted entirely to a discussion of the new law. Field men will be instructed as to its operation and they will also be told just what is expected of them this year in law enforcement.

An educational program has been prepared, and men who have long been identified with forestry interests on the Pacific coast and elsewhere will be heard. A demonstration of portable power pumps will be given Monday afternoon.

MAT CHAMPION IS SALEM YOUTH

Clayton Frye, who this week won the national amateur middleweight boxing championship, has his home in Salem and is the son of P. S. Frye of this city. It became known yesterday, P. S. Frye in chapel guard at the state penitentiary and lives at 435 North 19th street. His son represented the Los Angeles boxing club at Boston, knocking out Gerald Bockhausen of Detroit in the semifinals and eliminating Michael Zingale of Milwaukee in the finals of the meet.

Young Frye has attended the Oregon Agricultural college, leaving there in the spring of 1922. His father states that he will probably return to the Corvallis school. He belongs to a fraternity there.

"Clayton was born in Denver, and raised in Oregon," said the elder Mr. Frye yesterday. His home has been in Salem for the past three years, although he has not lived here steadily all that time.

Clayton Frye boxed 21 times for Multnomah before going to Los Angeles in 1923. He dropped only two bouts of the 21. In 1921 he won both city and Pacific northwest middleweight championship. He has also won several titles in California.

TOURIST MAP OF OREGON PUT OUT IN CALIFORNIA

Anglers, hunters and recreation seekers who sense the call of the north will find a veritable mine of information in an outing map of the state of Oregon prepared by the outing and map service department of the Automobile Club of Southern California for its members and visiting motorists.

The map is 24 by 36 inches, and in addition to the highways, rivers and lakes, it shows in red ink camp sites, where supplies are obtainable, where gasoline and oil can be had, postoffices, meals and lodgings, where guides, packers and animals are obtainable, where boats are for rent, ranches where butter and eggs, etc., may be purchased, points of special interest, scenic areas, water falls, main trails and game refuges.

On the reverse side of the map is printed a list of detailed information including Roosevelt highway, McKenzie river, Middle Fork of the Willamette country, Columbia river highway, and Mt. Hood Loop, Pacific highway, Klamath lake, Crater lake, Diamond lake and Upper Rogue river and a list of golf clubs in the state. There is also a general mileage
