

RAIN EXPECTED TO HALT SUNDAY BASEBALL GAME

Old Jupiter Pluvius has spoiled the entertainment for the baseball fans this week and will cause the postponement of the clash between the Salem Senators and the Vancouver club of the Interstate league. The game is scheduled for Oxford park at 3 p. m., but the grounds are pretty wet and they will be unable to play unless the precipitation stops soon.

The Senators opened their league season with a win last Sunday and they were planning on taking the Washington nine into camp, although they were expecting a hard game.

The rain also delayed the Salem high school game this afternoon, when the red and black were to meet the Amity team on the Oxford park diamond. This is the third game of the season that has been postponed for the rain. The game with the Chemawa Indians which has been postponed twice already has been scheduled for next Wednesday if it doesn't rain.

Rip King, former catcher for the Portland team, is catcher and manager for the Vancouver club and from all reports they have a strong aggregation, although they lost the decision to the West Linu nine last Sunday by a score of 10 to 9.

Emil Hauser of Chemawa has been appointed by the league officials as the umpire for the game. Hauser caught for the Senators at one time and is mighty good but is getting a little old for the backstop position. He has also acted as arbitrator in several of the games here and is well liked by the Salem fans.

"Frisco" Edwards, manager of the locals, has announced that Carl Blanchard will be at the first sack for the Senators in the next game. He was unable to be here for the first game as he was ill, but is now out of bed and feeling fine.

42 HINDUS ARE DEPORTED

San Francisco, Cal., April 18.—Forty-two East Indians, gathered in various parts of the United States were here for deportation today to India on the steamer President Taft. The Hindus are sent out of the country as "undesirable aliens," most of them slipped into the United States in

defiance of the immigration restrictions barring their race. Sixty aliens, taken out of California prisons, reformatories, almshouses and asylums will be dispatched April 24 in special barred and guarded cars for Ellis island, there to be deported to their former homes in Europe. All have become public charges since they entered the United States and are therefore subject to deportation.

WATER CONTEST ON DESCHUTES RIVER SETTLED

Subject to approval by the state engineering department, a settlement by stipulation has been effected in the Deschutes river water rights adjudication case. A copy of the stipulation between the contending parties was received yesterday by State Engineer Rhea Loper. Testimony in the adjudication was taken by representatives of the state engineering department last fall and has since been under consideration by the department. It is suspected that the influence back of the stipulation is contemplated power development by the Deschutes Falls Power company at the Shearer Bridge site, the

company, Suttle Lake Irrigation district, Powell Butte Irrigation district, Jefferson Water Conservancy district, South Unit Improvement district, West Side Reclamation district, Deschutes County Municipal Improvement district and Ochoco Irrigation district. The lower claimants in the contest have been asserting rights to the flow of the Deschutes at locations on the lower portion of the river, and the upper claimants to portions of the flow of the stream or some of its tributaries at points of diversion above the mouth of Crooked river.

Francis of which has doubtless been hindered by the fact that the water rights were in controversy. The real fight in the case has been between the power interests, or lower claimants, and the irrigation interests, or upper claimants. The lower claimants are the Deschutes Falls Power company and the Columbia Deschutes Power company. The upper claimants are the North Canal company, Walker Basin Irrigation company, Crook County Improvement district, No. 1, Central Oregon Irrigation district, Deschutes Reclamation & Irrigation company, Odia Falls Land



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
