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Concert By Faculty Is Announced

An unusual musical opportunity will be offered the Salem public next Wednesday evening when three members of the Willamette university school of music will give a concert in Waller hall on the Willamette campus. The affair is being sponsored by the Salem branch of the American Association of University Women and is in the nature of a benefit concert for the local organization.

The opportunity is unusual in that it is only seldom that one program combines three artists such as Prof. Emory W. Hobson, whose voice is thoroughly trained and a pleasure to the ear, William Wallace Graham, violinist, and Miss Franca Virginia Melton, pianist.

Professor Hobson, a graduate of the Cincinnati college of music, won the Springer gold medal with distinction, while he was an undergraduate. He also studied with Signor Lino Mattioli. For the past five years he has been head of the Willamette school of music and his work as director of the university glee clubs and director of the First Methodist church choir is too well known to require elucidation.

William Wallace Graham spent ten years in Europe studying under eminent masters of the violin and served as assistant instructor in Berlin where he taught and coached under Henri Martini who recommends Mr. Graham highly. During a recent concert in Portland the Oregonian critic said of him: "This distinguished violinist has few equals in the northwest. His technique is flawless and his tone quality remarkable for its beauty, fluency and individuality."

In her training as a pianist Miss Melton has had unusual opportunities and among those with whom she has studied are William H. Sherwood (Chicago), Wagner Swaine and Harold Bauer (Paris), Severin Eisenberg (Berlin) and Theodor Leschetizky (Vienna). Miss Melton has concertized in the Orient as well as taught, having her headquarters in Tokio.

During a recent MacDowell club concert Miss Melton made her first Salem appearance. Her popularity was instantaneous and permanent.

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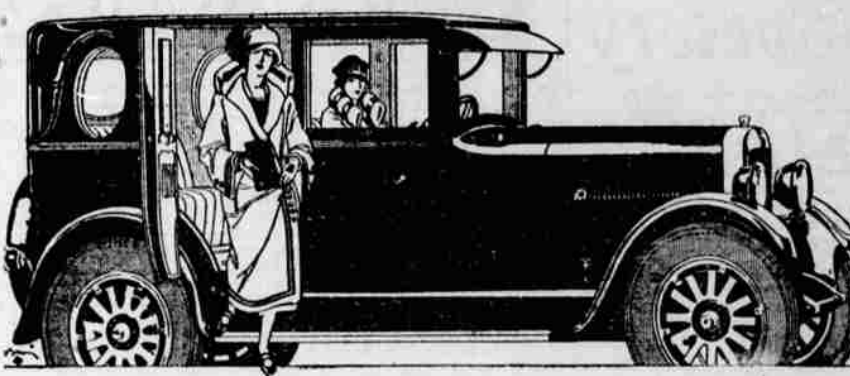
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
