

UNCLE OF OREGON SUPREME COURT JUSTICE KILLED

Information was received here yesterday of the accidental death in Spokane Saturday night of Judge George W. Belt of that city, formerly a judge of the superior court in Spokane. He was an uncle of Justice Harry H. Belt and a brother in law of Justice George H. Burnett, both of the Oregon supreme court, having been a brother of the late Mrs. Burnett. The late Mrs. Ed Weller of Salem was a niece of Judge Belt.

Judge Belt was born in Salem on the old Belt homestead at Union and Church streets August 13, 1854. He was graduated from Willamette university and admitted to the bar in Salem about 1884. From 1886 to 1888 he was district attorney of this district, and in 1888 went to Spokane where he rose to prominence in the law profession.

Judge Belt leaves in his immediate family his widow and four children. The children are Warren Belt of Seattle, Alfred Belt of Boise, Mrs. Raymond Ballou of Tacoma and Mrs. Willard Talkington of Spokane.

Judge Belt was instantly killed when he was struck by a bicycle ridden by James Kieren, a post office messenger, who was blinded by a heavy rain fall. Judge and Mrs. Belt were crossing the street at the time in front of their home. Mrs. Belt also was knocked down but not seriously injured.

"PRINCE" ADMITS TITLE IS BASED UPON FANCY

New York, April 20.—His claim to his title having been questioned, "Prince" Rudolf Magometoff Hiltzoff, professional dancer, who was married to Delight Potter Arnold, daughter of an American army officer in Washington Monday, has admitted that he is not a member of Russian nobility.

Hiltzoff said that in his own city of Tiflis, in the republic of Georgia, he was a "first boy" not a Russian, and never claimed to be. He said he and his ancestors had fought the Russians for 67 years.

"Here they call me a prince," he said. "That is how they translate my title. You have no better word with which to describe it."

He admitted that he had been in the United States for 17 months though his passport is only good for five months.

SEEKERS FOR "GOLOR" ARE HEAVILY INSURED

New York, April 20.—Arthur Train, lawyer-novelist and Ernest Schelling, pianist-composer, prior to their departure on the liner France today for a three month trip through the Balkans and Near East, took out \$500,000 bandits insurance with Lloyds. Lloyds have contracted to pay 99 per cent of any ransom demanded in case the travelers are kidnaped.

Mr. Train and Mr. Schelling pay a premium of 2 per cent, or \$10,000.

Mr. Train and Mr. Schelling said they were going to the Balkans to obtain "atmosphere," for an opera on which they are collaborating. The scene is laid in the Fayum desert.

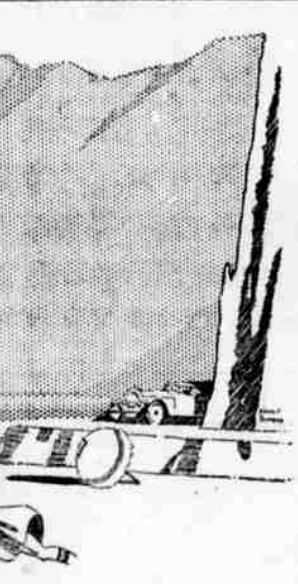
