University Students to Appear Here

The combined University of Oregon men's and women's glee clubs and orchestra will give a concert at the Grand Thursday night. It will be the first time that the two glee clubs and orchestra have combined in one concert.

John Stark Evans, assistant dean of music, who is director of the glee clubs, will have 24 voices in each glee club. It is expected that Rex Underwood, director of the orchestra, will bring about 30 musicians, thus making a concert of 78 people.

The two glee clubs, without the orchestra, after long training, gave a concert in Eugene Thursday night which was very successful. The same program will be given by the glee clubs at Salem but it will be condensed, as the orchestra also will have an important part and the numbers will be so arranged that each glee club and the orchestra will give separate selections and then in several numbers the three will combine.

Frank Jue of Portland, well known Chinese tenor, who has appeared both in Portland and Salem under the name of Jue Fong, will give a tenor solo, "Onaway, Awake, Beloved," which will be part of Coleridge-Taylor's "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast," the principal selection on the glee clubs' program. The song is very beautiful, containing many difficult passages. Roy Bryson of Eugene also will render a solo, "A Bitterness of Love" (Dunn) and "To the Sun" (Curran). Except for these two, there will be no individual solos.

Among the Salem students, members of the glee clubs, are Mary West, second alto, and Pauline Knowland, second soprano. Each is well known in Salem having appeared in high school recitals here.
