SEVERE STORM SWEEPS ACROSS EASTERN STATES

Chicago, April 20.—(By Associated Press)—A severe wind and rain storm, accompanied by proportions of tornado in some localities swept a disastrous course from the Mississippi to New England yesterday. Several persons were killed and in the neighborhood of two score injured while property damage was estimated at \$1,500,000.

New England was deluged with snow and low temperatures were reported at many points. Scores of buildings were destroyed or unroofed, trees were felled, boats were beached and telephone telegraph and power service crippled while fire in some towns completed destruction in the wake of high winds and driving rains.

Churches were marked suffering the roofs or steeples of several being carried away. Services were in progress within, but with cut injury to congregation. Two persons were killed in Peoria, Ill. in the collapse of a building, while a man was electrocuted at Macomb, Ill., when he picked up a live wire blown down by the storm. Ten were injured at Wheeling, W. Va., 15 at Pittsburgh two at Millbrook, Pa., and a dozen others in scattered towns throughout of the storm area.

In central Illinois, Peoria and Pekin were the hardest hit. In Peoria, where property damage was estimated at \$500,000, two night watchmen were killed when a five story brick block crumpled. The storm in Peoria drove families to the streets in panic. A repetition of the record storm swept through the southern part of the state was feared. All through the business quarter plate glass windows were shattered by hail.

Three cows were beached at Racine, Wis., when torn loose from their moorings. Four and one half inches of snow fell at Duluth the snow fall at Wausau, Wis., N. H. was reported at 14 inches.

BOOTLEGGER CAUGHT HERE AS SPEEDER

(Continued from page one) Country that Dunin told him of the shooting. He said he wanted them to ascertain if Turner was dead and to bring one of the automobiles back to Santa Barbara. Dunin, Leator and Thom were all subsequently arrested through a chain of circumstances that pointed to the guilt of the two former. Thom was released but was instructed by the district attorney to remain in Santa Barbara as a witness in the trial which was to be held March 10. Thom now says that he has not been informed as to the outcome of the trial if it was held at that time.

Says He Was Freed Thom says his father, Rubie Thom, was ill at the time at his home at Lebanon, and that he informed the authorities that since it was about six weeks until the trial he wished to make a trip into Oregon to see him. He was allowed to do so, but his father died before his arrival at Lebanon. Thom's next move was to Seattle where he says he wanted to collect some money that was due him in Seattle, according to his story, he became ill and his physician would not allow him to return. He told the doctor that he was wanted in Santa Barbara as a witness in the murder case, but the physician told him that if he made the trip it would be at his own risk, so he decided not to go.

Recently Thom and his wife went from Seattle to Portland and while there found out that he was wanted for embezzlement of the automobile. He claims the dealer from whom he bought the car owes him \$112 and that he wrote the dealer to give him credit for payments due. When arrested last night Thom claims he was trying to get back to California with the car. His wife became ill in Portland, Thom claims, and they expected last night to reach his sister's home at Lebanon.

IN THE COURT

The injunction proceedings to halt the sale were brought by the Pacific Mail Steamship company, the only other bidder for the ships, which they now operate. The sale was awarded the Dollar interest by four to three vote of the board after counsel for the board had declared the Pacific Mail bid illegal.
