COMBINED GLEE CLUBS WILL SING CLASSIC MUSIC

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 21.—(Special.)—Most of the members of the University of Oregon glee clubs and orchestra, which will give a joint concert at the Grand theater at Salem, Thursday night, will leave Eugene, Thursday afternoon and morning. Many students, however, will take advantage of the opportunity to spend an enjoyable day at Eugene, visiting the state house, the penitentiary and the asylum, which is both interesting and educational, and will go to the capital city a day two ahead of the main group.

The concert this year promises to surpass all previous ones, as it will be the largest ever given by the university away from home and, for the first time in the history of the school, will present the two glee clubs, men's and women's, and the orchestra jointly on a foreign floor.

A concert also will be given in Portland, Friday night, at the Hellig theater. These two will be the only ones to be given away from home this year. James Leake, student manager, has been assigned with requests to give concerts all along the coast, but it was thought best to give only two concerts this year so that students will not miss too much school.

Rex Underwood, head of the violin department at the university, will take along an orchestra composed of between 35 and 40 pieces. The glee clubs will have even a larger personnel, composed of 24 in each of the clubs.

Only classical music will be presented. This will be the first attempt of any college in the northwest to give a program made up entirely of classical selections.

John Stark Evans, director of the glee clubs, will present Frank Jue, popular Chinese tenor, in the song, "Onaway, Awake, Beloved," which is a part of Coeurd'Alene Taylor's "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast," the principal selection to be given by the glee clubs. Mr. Jue, better known to Salemites as Jue Fong, has sung several times at the First Christian church of Salem. He is well known all along the coast and is one of Portland's leading tenors.

Mr. Jue has the distinction of being one of the few singers to be re-engaged five times by the Columbia theater of Portland. He also sang at the leading show houses in Seattle, San Francisco, Oakland, Los Angeles and many other cities in Washington and California, singing at the different movie houses the last two summers. Next fall Mr. Jue will go to Boston to continue his studies.

Silverton, Or., April 21.—(Special.)—Mrs. J. P. Larsen died at 10:29 o'clock at the Larson home on Second street Sunday evening following an illness of a few days. Arrangements for the funeral services have not yet been made as word is awaited from children in eastern states.

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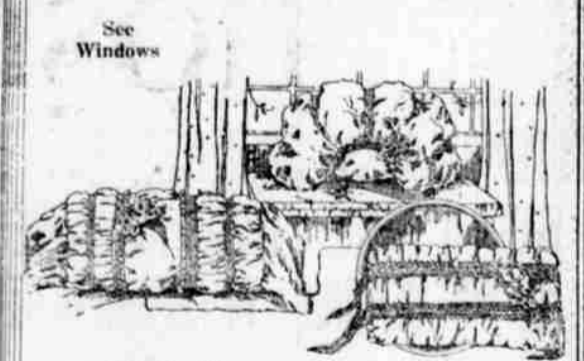

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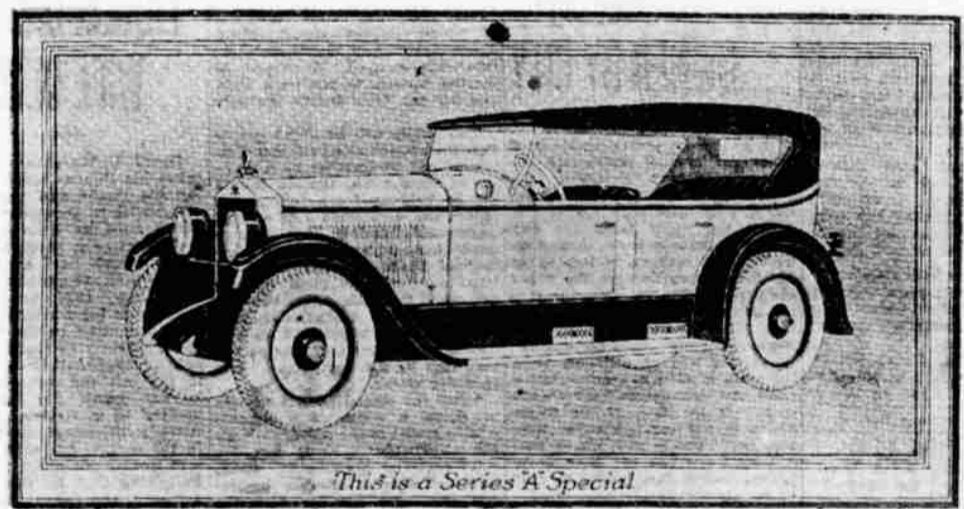
