BANK IS HIGHEST BIDDER ON BONDS SOLD BY COUNCIL

With six bidders entered in the competition the United States National bank of Salem was last night the highest bidder for \$20,883.05 Salem improvement bonds. The bids were opened at the regular meeting of the city council.

The council voted to sell for \$2500 to the Oregon Contracting company of Portland the two-block street paver which is being replaced by a new plant of larger capacity for which the city is expending about \$7000.

Another stroke of economy which was urged upon the council by Street Commissioner Lowell Petterson, were received for the construction of sewers for the block formed by Maple avenue, South street and Columbia street; for the district on Rural avenue between Winter and Hoyt street and for the Frickey-Market-Cross street district.

Petitions for sidewalks came in for the north side of River street between Water and Front streets and for lots 1 and 2, block 3, of Central addition. These were referred to the street committee.

FORMER CONVICT SLUGS GUARD AND MAKES ESCAPE

Roseburg, Ore., Apr. 21.—Lee Duncan, ex-convict, held in the county jail charged with the robbery of four local stores, escaped this morning after slugging Deputy Sheriff George Sewell when the latter entered the cage where Duncan was confined to leave the man's breakfast.

Duncan rolled up his bedding in the form of a dummy, to cause the officer to believe he was asleep on his cot. He then hid near the entrance and as Sewell entered struck him over the head with a heavy china tea cup wrapped up in an old sock. The officer was stunned, but grappled with Duncan, and the two fought for several minutes before the prisoner finally broke loose and fled. The deputy tried to follow, but was blinded with blood from the cuts on his head and was unable to recapture the man
