

CONFESSIONS OF ALLEGED STOCK ASSASSINS HELD

Cairo, Egypt, April 22.—The judicial authorities have published what they state to be a summary of the confession of some of the men accused in connection with the assassination last November of the sirdar of Egypt, General Sir Lee Stack.

Abdel Pattach Anayat, one of the accused, is quoted as declaring that following the failure of the conversations between the Egyptian and British premiers in London, he met with Dr. Shafik Mansur Mahmud Lemall at Dr. Shafik's house when it was decided to commit a series of political murders with the sirdar as the first victim.

The declaration says the trio believed the independence of Egypt could only be gained by the political murders.

All the persons mentioned in Abdel's confession have been arrested.

CRANKS CAR FOR WOMAN

Los Angeles, Cal., April 22.—The sight of a woman motorist struggling hopelessly with a car that would not start aroused the chivalrous soul of Clifford Whitlow as he walked along a boulevard here last night and he stepped forward at once to crank the car. The engine started under his vigorous twirling, but the kick back of the crank broke his arm.

"Now isn't that too bad?" sympathized the motorist as she drove away.

"It certainly is," agreed Whitlow as he walked to the receiving hospital and had the broken bone set.

Start Hunger Strike

Berlin, April 22.—Fifty communists held in the city jail on charges of political offenses have begun a hunger strike in protest against what they allege is the intentional delay by the authorities in bringing them to trial.

MEXICANS SMUGGLED IN LOCKED BOX CAR

Los Angeles, Cal., April 22.—Francisco Cabrilla and his wife, aged Guadalupe couple, paid their last \$10 to a brakeman on the Mexican Central railroad to seal them in a boxcar bound for the United States, the land of their dreams. So today they were in an American jail on American soil, awaiting deportation from the land they risked starvation to reach. They were discovered half dead from hunger, when the boxcar was unsealed in the Southern Pacific yards here yesterday. With them was a young girl. All three were taken to the receiving hospital.

NEAR DEATHLESS WARS FORECAST

Omaha, Neb., April 22.—Not deathless wars, but something approximating them, will some day be waged, Major General Amos A. Fries, chief of the chemical warfare service of the United States army, told newspapermen here yesterday.

Chemical warfare, the general said, is not being developed along the lines attaining great and sudden loss of life. "Rather," he continued, "it is being developed whereby wars and battles may be won without great loss of life, without working permanent injury to the people of cities which may be attacked—but to incapacitate such cities and peoples that may be taken. Human life is of greater value in warfare today than it has ever been in history.

The World war was the most humane, General Fries said. The wars of ancient times were wars of horror and casualty. Only two deaths occurred for every 100 persons gassed, he said, while 25 deaths resulted from the same number of individuals struck by bullets by high explosive shells.

SUBSTITUTE FOR WELL OIL SOUGHT

Washington, April 22.—Fifty leaders in the oil industry were asked by the president's oil conservation board in letters today for their views concerning possible substitutes for domestic well oil and the products now derived therefrom.

The board, of which Secretary

Work is chairman was advised by government experts that an average of 23,000 gallons of gasoline is being used daily in the United States. The experts report noted that this country "is the largest producer and the largest consumer of petroleum with rapidly diminishing resources."

Questions propounded in the board's letter included: "Broadly speaking, does the utilization of one or more of the petroleum substitutes mentioned, or other with which you may be familiar, offer possibilities of immediate importance in relation to the conservation of petroleum?"

"What measures, if any, would you care to recommend to the end that this nation might be prepared to utilize these or other substitutes to the best advantage?"

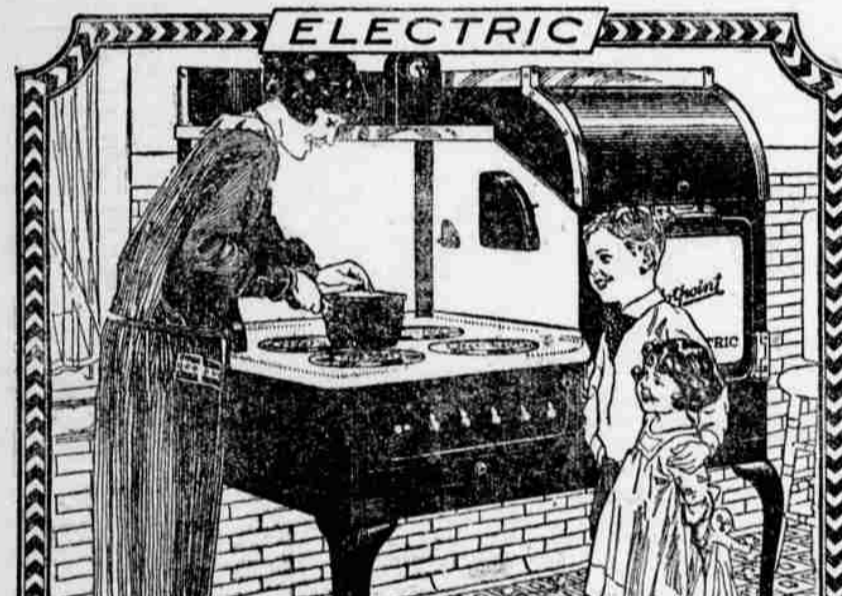
