

DEMPSEY SAYS KEARNS STILL FIGHT MANAGER

Omah, Neb., April 22.—Heavy-weight Champion Jack Dempsey, who, with his wife, formerly Estelle Taylor, moving picture actress passed through Omaha last night en route to New York to put the finishing touches on a picture in which the two are playing, declaring that he and his manager Jack Kearns are "not on the outside."

"He is my fight manager," Dempsey said, "and when he gets me a fight, then I will fight, but not until. He is my manager and we have not split our partnership."

"I am a little over-weight at present," the champion said. "I tip the beam around the 200 mark but hard work will bring me down to my regular fighting weight. I like to train and I like to fight. This movie work doesn't make a hit with me, but, its better than loafing around doing nothing."

Dempsey said he didn't think his manager had any fight in view. "I will see Tex Rickard when I arrive in New York," he said, "but as far as talking 'fight' is concerned, that's up to my manager."

"I don't think I will sign another movie contract soon," he said in response to a question. "Fighting is my business, not acting in the movies."

"But Jack makes a good actor," Mrs. Dempsey said with a smile.

Following completion of their pictures in New York, Mr. and Mrs. Dempsey expect to visit Europe on their honeymoon, after which they will return to their home in California.

RADIO CONFERENCE IN SEPTEMBER, PLAN

Washington, April 22.—Secretary Hoover has decided that the increasing pressure of radio problems on his department, which regulates in the radio field will require the calling of a national radio conference about the end of September.

Particularly have the differences of fitting in new radio stations given rise to suggestions for a new method of allocation and dividing time. Until the conference has assembled, however, no important changes of governmental policy may be expected.

MEXICAN TOWN IS DESTROYED

Douglas, Ariz., April 22.—Relief measures for more than 2000 persons made homeless and destitute by the conflagration which yesterday wiped out a large portion of the mining town of Cananea, 50 miles south of the international boundary, were under way today under the direction of the Red Cross.

More than 200 homes were wiped out by the flames which broke out in and gutted the business district. One person, a Chinese merchant, was known to have lost his life, and officials were trying to confirm reports that a Mexican family of three perished. The property loss is estimated at \$200,000, three-fourths of which was covered by insurance.

Cananea is one of the richest copper mining camps in Mexico.

GREAT NORTHERN PRESIDENT HERE

Interest in the development of the flax growing and spinning industry in the Willamette valley was manifested by Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern Railroad company, during the few minutes that he was in Salem yesterday afternoon. Mr. Budd was here only the few minutes that the Oregon Electric train stopped at the depot.

Mr. Budd said he was not familiar with the efforts now being made here to establish the flax industry, but the questions he asked about it indicated that he knew considerable about flax in general. He wanted to know about the acreage and whether the flax grown here was of the long-fibre variety.

Mr. Budd arrived on the 4 o'clock train from the south. Word had been received earlier in the day that he and his party would come from Corvallis by automobile but their plane was changed because of a desire to look over Oregon Electric properties en route.

Mr. Budd will return here Thursday of this week and expects to spend several hours in the city. He expects to arrive about noon. The railway president expressed himself optimistically about business conditions in general through out the northwest. With him here yesterday were A. J. Davidson of Portland, general freight agent, and J. M. Ballifical, assistant general freight agent.

DALLAS MAN LOSES IN SUIT

Dallas, Or., April 22.—A verdict was found for the plaintiff for \$306 by a jury Monday night in the case of O. E. Lierman of Hillsboro vs. C. J. Crook of Dallas. The case grew out of the sale or trade about four years ago when Mr. Crook secured a community grocery store in Dallas and other property at Hillsboro.

The claim involved goods alleged to have been left with Mr. Crook but not included in the trade. The defendant maintained that the transaction covered the goods involved. Mr. Crook was represented by William Harecombe of Dallas and Mr. Lierman by Joseph H. Jones of Portland.

MERCURY KILLED GIRL, IS REPORT

Indianapolis, Ind., April 22.—Mercury poisoning apparently caused the death of Miss Madge Oberholzer, for whose death D. C. Stephenson, former grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan and two others are being held, according to a pathologic finding reported here.

Dr. Virgil H. Moon, pathologist of the Indiana university school of medicine conducted the autopsy. Miss Oberholzer died last week from poison self-administered following alleged attacks by Stephenson.

Stephenson, Earl Kinck and Earl Gentry, indicted on first degree murder charges in connection with Miss Oberholzer's death are held without bond. They were arrested yesterday.

SANDE BACK IN SADDLE AGAIN

Havre De Grace, Md., April 21.—Earl Sande, America's famous jockey, today rode his first race since he was injured at Saratoga last summer and won with Sarazen, Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt's great gelding. It was Sarazen's first race of the year too.

Sarazen took the Newark handicap, a six furlong dash for three-year-olds in the time of 1:11 flat, breaking the track record by 1-5 second. He took the lead in the stretch and won easily by two lengths; Big Blaze was second and Tex the Vinter third. Two dollar mutuels on Sarazen paid \$2.30, \$2.70 and \$2.30.
