

WALKER NOW HAS CHANCE FOR TWO FISTIC TITLES

New York, Apr. 22—By the settlement of his long standing dispute with the New York state athletic commission over the challenge of Dave Shada, Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, has cleared the way for acceptance of his second opportunity within the short span of six months to achieve that oft sought but seldom gratified pugilistic desire—possession of two titles at the same time.

With no further obstacles to the match, Walker today will meet Promoter Humbert Fugate to sign articles for a world's middleweight title bout with Harry Greb of Pittsburgh on June 19 at the Polo Grounds.

Walker's initial attempt to annex a second crown, early this year at Newark, was a failure. He bargained for too much when he brought the light heavyweight champion of the world, Mike McTigue. Although Walker received the newspaper verdict, he failed to knock McTigue out.

Since he took the title from Jack Britton, Walker has engaged in 24 battles. Thirteen he won by knockouts, two by decision, eight other newspaper verdicts and one with Jimmy Jones was declared no contest.

In addition to weight, Walker will have greater experience in his favor. Where Walker has boxed sixty-one contests, Greb has appeared in 22.

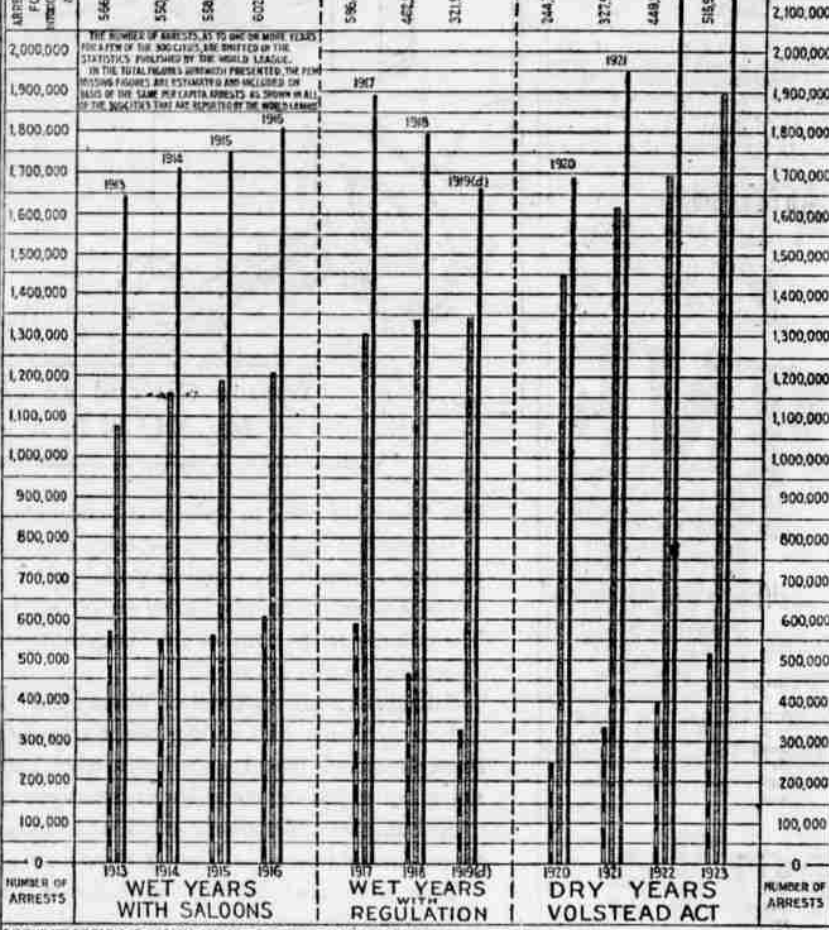

To the Editor:—I see articles after articles in certain newspapers in Oregon setting forth the protection that the high protective tariff is giving the American farmer and laboring man. Will you please give me space in your valuable paper to ask those editors to show me, for I am from beyond Missouri? If the high protective tariff is the only financial salvation the farmer and laboring man has, why does the manufactured products not fluctuate—raise and fall—with the raw materials like it did in 1896 under Grover Cleveland's last administration when the tariff was at its lowest and the G. O. P.'s called it free trade? And we heard a little more in those days about free trade than we have heard about Governor Pierce's white face calves since he was elected governor, but I suppose the governor is like some of the rest of us poor farmers, he had to give them away or let them starve under the high protective tariff, as I haven't heard much about those calves lately. Will you please go back with me to Grover Cleveland's last administration when the tariff was at its lowest. We sold our wheat for 25 cents per bushel, our corn for 50 cents per bushel, our hogs for 3 and 4 cents per pound, our cattle and sheep for 4 and 5 cents per pound, our wool for 20 to 30 cents per pound; we got \$1.25 to \$2 per day and our board for working in the woods and a place to sleep; we bought our sugar for 3 to 5 cents per pound; Arbuckle's coffee 8 to 12 cents per pound; pure candy, 6 to 10 cents per pound; calico 3 to 5 cents per yard;ingham, 5 to 8 cents per yard; muslin 6 to 12 cents per yard; men's wool suits \$10 to \$12 per suit; we bought AA cutter's logger shoes, hand made, 8 to 18-inch toe, from \$5 to \$7 per pair and one pair was worth two pairs of our \$15 shoes today. What will the above named manufactured article cost today? You figure it up. That great man, William McKinley, who was struck down in the performance of his duty, said in a speech in Boston, Mass., prior to his election and the latter part of Grover Cleveland's last administration, that the present administration wasn't to blame for the downfall in the prices of the farm products but it was an over-production. It took a man with brain and nerve, like Washington and Lincoln, in those days to stand up and say that the democratic party wasn't to blame and McKinley was in as much political danger and especially with his political boss, Mark Hanna, as a man would be in danger of his natural life to have said in time of the World War that Germany was in the right. And McKinley's statement has been proven beyond a doubt at least that it was true. Do you remember just after McKinley was elected they had a severe famine in India and wheat rose from 50 cents per bushel to \$1.55 per bushel in Chicago and when the hungry people of India were satisfied wheat dropped back to normal? Some of the millionaire wheat gamblers went up against the wall in Chicago before McKinley got a single whack at the law tariff and free trade. Do you remember after President Harding was elected how wheat, oats and corn took a slump? And many, many millionaire grain gamblers went up against the wall, all before President Harding got a single whack at the then high enough tariff? Why has wheat hovered around the 80-cent mark for the past four years under the present high protective tariff system until last fall when 75-cent

700 FAMILIES COME TO STATE

Portland, April 22—More than 700 new families representing an investment in excess of \$2,000,000, have been located in Oregon during the past year through the efforts of the Land Settlement department of the Portland chamber of commerce, according to a report completed by W. G. Ide, manager of the department, for presentation at the annual meeting of the Portland chamber, April 24.

During the same period, the number of agricultural inquiries received totaled more than 15,000, of whom 1,987 prospective settlers have definitely announced their intention of coming to Oregon this year. The report stresses particularly the active co-operation received by the land settlement department from a majority of the counties of the state, and calls attention to the enormous volume of inquiries received in recent months. During March, for example, more than 4700 requests for agricultural information were received, and these inquiries have been relayed to all chambers of commerce in the state.

91 FIREMEN WHO QUIT JOBS APPLY TO RETURN

Salt Lake City, Utah, April 22—Settlement of the crisis resulting from the resignation of 91 firemen, who submitted a blanket resignation last Thursday because of trouble with Fire Chief William H. Bywater, who has since resigned, rests with the city commission today.

After quitting work at 6 o'clock last night in accordance with their resignations, the firemen at a mass meeting decided to accept the city's offer and submit individual applications for re-employment.

Mayor C. C. Nelson last night said that practically all of the men had signed application blanks and intimated the city commission will act favorably upon them.

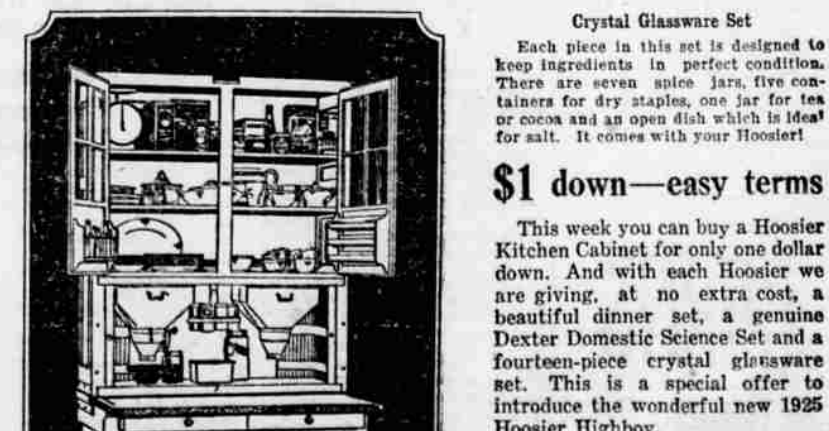
