A son, probably potentially one of the richest men in the world, has been born in St. Charles, Ill., to Mrs. Dellora Angell Norris, wife of Lester Norris, a commercial artist. Mrs. Norris inherited the \$25,000,000 fortune of her late uncle, "Bet a Million" John W. Gates. Judge Ben B. Lindsey, of Denver's Juvenile Court, had a lead of twenty-six in the completed report in connection with oyster proceedings brought by Royal H. Graham, who previously had been declared defunct by the Election Commission. Prince Youssof, Russian nobleman and one of the slayers of the mystic monk, Rasputin, suing Joseph E. Widener in New York courts for the return of famous Rembrandt paintings, was charged by Widener's lawyers with attempting to regain the pictures to sell them at a higher figure.
