The answer goes on to state that on August 5 the bonding company filed an affidavit stating that in November, 1923, the property in question had been transferred by Payne & Padrick to the bonding company on a bill of sale, the value of the property being at that time placed at \$10,000. The bonding company, the answer states, demanded release of the property on the strength of the bill of sale.

The sheriff then impounded a jury of six men who heard the evidence and held that the sheriff was right fully holding the property for the Northwestern National bank. Subsequent to that the bonding company started its present action.
