## FLOYD D. MOORE RESUMES WORK AS PEDAGOGUE

Dallas, Or., April 25.—Information has just reached this city that Floyd D. Moore, former county clerk of Polk county who now resides at 655 Hood street, Salem, has been elected city school superintendent of Milwaukie school district. Mr. Moore was engaged in school work for many years prior to 1919 when he entered the office here as county clerk. He served for six years as county clerk and did not try to succeed himself at the last election, preferring to complete his law course at Willamette university where he is studying at present and expects to graduate with the 1925 law class. While in Polk county Mr. Moore was active in politics and civic development. He was elected president of the county clerk's state association at the 1923-24 convention. He was urged to seek the nomination for secretary of state at the last primary election but refused to seek further political honors.

Mr. Moore has served with many civic and fraternal organizations during his many years residence in this city, among those activities as member of the city council, president of the Polk County Chautauqua association, member of the commercial club and an active worker in several fraternal organizations.

## PLAN TO CLIMB UNSCALED PEAK

Seattle, Wash., April 25.—Making final preparations for the ascent of Mount Logan, an unscalped peak in British Columbia, 19,500 feet high, an expedition consisting of eleven members was forming here today. M. H. Read of Boston and H. M. Laine, Canadian government naturalist and photographer, arrived yesterday. H. F. Lambert of Ottawa, Canadian geodetic survey officer, and second in command of the party, was to arrive today. M. S. McCarty, who is to direct the expedition is already in Alaska, making plans for the climb.

The mountaineers are to leave here Sunday on the steamer Alaska for Cordova, where they will travel over the Copper river railroad as far as it goes. From the end of the railroad the party will proceed by pack train about 100 miles into the wilderness to a base camp on one of the northern glaciers of Mount Logan.
