

PERSECUTION OF JEWS IS DENIED BY BULGARIANS

Berlin, April 28.—(By Associated Press)—The Bulgarian legation here has issued a denial of reports that Jews are being subjected to systematic persecution in Bulgaria. The statement says that the Jewish population enjoys the same rights as other citizens.

Sofia, Bulgaria, April 28.—The authorities at Varna claim to have seized two hundred kilograms of explosives collected by conspirators plotting to blow up the police headquarters, the two banks and other public buildings. It is stated that a document was seized proving that the Bulgarian communists responsible for the recent outrages were receiving money from Russia.

VETERINARIANS TO DISCUSS LAW

Veterinarians of the county have been called by the county court to meet at the court house here at 10 o'clock on the morning of May 4 to discuss with the court the enforcement of the new county herd inspection law which becomes effective on May 28.

Up to date there have been four candidates for appointment as county herd inspectors, these including Dr. W. G. Morehouse of Salem, Dr. G. F. Kunk of Stayton, Dr. A. W. Simmons of Silverton and Dr. Thomas Simms of Woodburn.

According to the tentative plan now in mind the court will suggest to the veterinarians that the county be divided into four inspection districts and that each veterinarian have charge of the district in which he resides. The law provides an inspection of all dairy animals at least once a year, these animals to be submitted to tuberculin tests. The veterinarian is to be paid as the county directs, but not to exceed \$10 a day. He may have as many deputies as the court may care to allow, but these deputies are to be paid at a rate similar to that paid to veterinarians. It is believed there would be no difficulty in dividing the county under the law as now proposed and by such division the court feels that the law could be carried out as intended, with a complete test of all animals covered by the law, once a year.

2 LOSE LIVES IN ELECTION RIOTS

Nogales, Ariz., April 28.—Election day (Casta cost) the lives of two men in Nogales, Sonora, Mexico, yesterday. Four others were injured and may not live. The dead are Alvaro Valenzuela and Liberado Castro. Both were shot.

The election is believed to have resulted in the naming of Dr. Fernando Priego, red candidate, to the office of "presidente," or mayor, of Nogales, Sonora, although the ballots have not been counted. The ballots are kept in glass bowls and observers say that the red ballots predominate over the red and green cast for the opposing candidate, Jesus Tejerina.

Officials of the Mexican city says that charges will be filed against Tejerina, alleging that he attempted to storm the polling place and take the ballots cast.

CALIFORNIA TOWN IS AGAIN SWEEPED BY FIRE

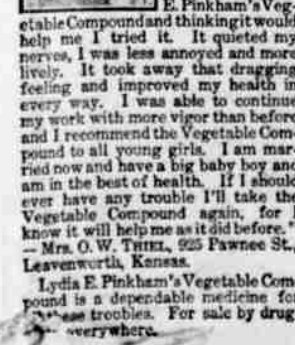

PLAN FOR 2 DAY INSTITUTE HERE

Teachers of the county have decided to hold a two-days annual institute in Salem next year under a new law going into effect providing that either one day or two day institutes may be held. Attendance on this institute will be compulsory on all county teachers.

The past year there has been no such institute, the teachers attending local institutes in the various districts. It is expected at the annual institute some particularly strong speaker will be secured and it is planned to make it a record affair.

According to reports more than the usual number of teachers in the county schools are planning to attend summer school this year, some going to the university, some to the college, some to the normal school and others planning to attend summer school at institutions outside of the state.
