WEST SALEM TO VOTE ON WATER BONDS ON MAY 8

With a mass meeting in the basement of the West Salem church Friday night, efforts will be made to reach an understanding between residents of West Salem regarding the bond issue of \$5000 to be voted on May 8. The money is for the purpose of adding to facilities of the West Salem municipal water plant. Coming up for vote a month ago, the bonds were turned down by a majority of two votes. Many residents of West Salem believe that the proposition was misunderstood and that at a general mass meeting it can be explained and definite understanding reached. John A. Gesser, mayor of the city, has called the meeting.

West Salem now has a \$25,000 water system, which is pronounced by the state board of health to furnish water as pure as any in the state. No chemical of any kind is required to be put into the water to purify it. With the growth of the city, however, a new well and additional equipment is declared to be necessary. A cannery being built in West Salem, which will employ 30 men and 70 women during 5 months of the year, is rapidly nearing completion and will be ready for use when canning season starts. Other industries are also drawing people to West Salem, with the effect that the present water supply is rapidly becoming inadequate, it is said.

As the situation has been explained by Mayor Gesser, a state law prevents a municipal corporation from using water bonds to purchase equipment for the municipal water plant. A bond issue is necessary, he says, and the bonds must gradually be retired by applying money secured through direct taxation. The present budget of the city is approximately \$6000 a year and Mr. Gesser estimates that \$500 could be used to pay off the bonds.

MILL CITY RESIDENT, 90 YEARS OLD, PASSES

Mill City, Or., April 29.—Mrs. Smith, who has been a resident of Mill City for the past 26 years, passed away at his home here Thursday, at the age of 90 years and 4 months.

Mr. Smith was born in Chautauq, Oreg. county, New York, in 1835, where he later met and married Miss Annis Campbell in 1856. In 1859 they move to Mill City, where they have since resided. Mr. Smith working as a woodman and farmer all of his life, and had a host of friends who mourn his departure. He enjoyed perfect health all of his life, even to the day of his death, when rising from bed to dress himself, he lay back again, dead.

He is survived by four children, E. A. Smith, C. B. Smith and Mrs. John Smith all of Mill City, and Mrs. C. L. Peck of Cosmopolis, Wash.; six grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. Funeral services were held Saturday, interment being in the Fairview cemetery, near Gates.

CLOVERDALE GARAGE MAN ACCUSED BY GIRL

Dallas, Or., April 29.—Leland Hoy, Cloverdale garage man, age 25, was charged with statutory rape in a warrant issued today. Hoy is under arrest in Tillamook county, following investigation of a case involving a 15-year-old girl, but it was found that the case originated in Polk county and the evidence was turned over to district Attorney Helgeson to prosecute.

Hoy is alleged to have given three young girls a ride in his car from near Tillamook to Hebo and later to have again picked them up and taken them to Portland, where he left them. The girls, whose homes were near Hebo, were running away to Portland. This took place on April 24.

Sheriff Hooker left Tuesday night for Tillamook to bring Hoy to Dallas, where he will be given a hearing.

PUBLIC MARKET FOR WOODBURN HELD ASSURED

Woodburn, Or., April 29.—The proposed installation of a Saturday market in Woodburn promises to become an established fact. Both merchants and farmers favor the project and a committee, consisting of H. L. Gill, Otto Durant and John Romage, has been appointed to see that both are constructed and properly contracted for occupation on specified days and that all agreements are carried out. It is probable that from three to six stalls will be established. The popular demand is for celery, lettuce and asparagus. The stalls will be restricted to farmers, who will be restricted to the sale of their own produce. A companion project is that of free Saturday afternoon matinees at the Bungalow theater for farmers and their families. Big films will be shown from 2:30 to 4 o'clock. The business men will help finance the project, the details of which has been placed in the hands of the following committee: H. L. Gill, H. M. Austin and Virgil Haller. Both projects will undoubtedly prove mutually beneficial to those sharing in perfecting them.

The annual school fair of the Woodburn public schools will be held at the high school gymnasium on Friday, May 1. M. A. Scheiber, chairman of the committee in charge, has mapped the floor and wall space for about 200 stalls to each department. Exhibits and demonstrations in art work, typing, mimeographing, shop work, cooking, sewing, general class room products, boys' and girls' club work will be presented throughout the afternoon and evening. The fair has been completed this year with the May day exercises. Three quonsetones from the high school, one from the East Side grade school and one from the West Side grade school—will be crowned on the campus in front of the high school and three Maypoles will be simultaneously wound. The north Marion declamatory contest will be held in the auditorium and the track meet on the athletic field during the afternoon.

TRAGEDY UNBALANCES MIND OF KOLSCHINSKY

Scotts Mills, Or., April 29.—Joseph Kolschinsky, whose four children were killed by an explosion at their home Saturday, apparently has been deranged by grief, according to George Kretz, a friend of the family, who disinterred the body of Clara, 10, to be brought here for burial. Kretz said the father threatened to kill his son Ted, 17, "to fill up the hole in the ground" after the girl's body was disinterred.

Funeral services for the children were held here today. The father refused to attend, and friends persuaded Mrs. Kolschinsky and Ted to stay here until the man's condition could be investigated.
