

PEASANT UNION DENIES PART IN BULGARIAN PLOT

Sofia, May 1.—(By Associated Press)—The agrarian peasant union issues a lengthy statement to the Bulgarian people denying any connivance in or sympathy with the recent terrorist acts, which are declared to have been perpetrated in individuals "tempted by Moscow gold."

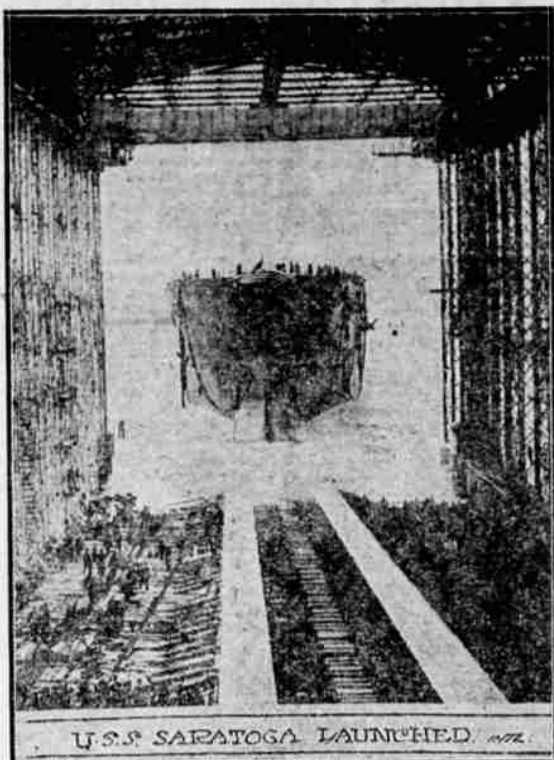
The union maintains that it is a legitimate organization working along legitimate lines and that it has nothing in common with the Bulgarian emigrants abroad, notably those in Jugoslavia and Czechoslovakia, whom it characterizes as traitors because, it says, they are aspiring toward foreign intervention in Bulgaria's affairs.

The statement ends with an appeal to all Bulgarians to rally around the forces of law and order during the most critical stage in the country's history.

Another of the ring leaders in the recent cathedral bombing plot was accounted for yesterday when former Deputy Granatshoff who had been sought everywhere was located by the police and, upon his refusal to surrender was shot and killed.

Three Russians, the first of this nationality to be arrested during the recent troubles, have been taken into custody at Philippopol. They were found in a cellar containing ammunition.

Great 'Plane Carrier Launched



U.S.S. SARATOGA LAUNCHED

Above is shown the U. S. S. Saratoga, largest and speediest airplane carrier in the world, gliding into the water from the ways at Camden, N. J., after she had been christened by Mrs. Curtis D. Wilbur, wife of the Secretary of the Navy. The 33,000-ton ship, with a speed of thirty-five land miles an hour, will cost \$45,000,000 when completed. She will carry seventy-two airplanes, which she launches from her flat decks.

BETTER HOMES WEEK IN SALEM TO OPEN MAY 10

"Better Homes Week" will be observed in Salem, May 10 to 15. An extensive better homes campaign will be carried on in the city during the week. The campaign will consist of an exhibition of a modern six-room house, a series of window displays in downtown districts and an essay contest among public school children.

The Salem chamber of commerce is offering a cash prize of \$25 to the firm producing the best window display featuring the idea of better homes. Judging of displays will be made on Wednesday, May 13, by a committee from the chamber of commerce.

The Marion-Polk County Realty association offers three prizes for essays by students of public schools in the city. There will be three general essay contests, one among high school students, one among junior high and a third among grade school students. Prizes offered by the realty association consist of \$5 for the best essay among each of the three contests.

A house built by Wenger Bros. at the corner of Liberty and Myers streets, opposite the Lincoln school, will be thrown open to the public during the week. It will be completely furnished by Giesepowers Furniture company, who will be assisted by Mrs. Claudine Mellinger and Mrs. F. E. Barber in selecting furnishings suitable for a home of moderate income.

Essays will be judged 40 points on subject matter, 40 points on originality and 20 points on originality of manuscript.

POLICE NAMED IN LIQUOR CASE

Denver, Colo., May 1.—Charges of graft and bribery, lodged against ten Denver policemen, including nine members of the "boothleg" squad, were contained in the testimony of the first witness called to the stand in the quarter trial of the officers which started today before Manager of Safety Reuben Hershey.

Max Cohen, the witness, testified that he had been engaged in illicit liquor traffic until four months ago. During a period covering three years, he said, he paid \$20 a month to one of the accused officers for "protection."

The men were charged with giving protection to liquor dealers, gamblers and houses of ill fame by Mayor Benjamin F. Stapleton and City Attorney Henry May as an aftermath of the anti-vice raids that began here on Good Friday.

BROOKLYN CLUB PRESIDENT DEAD

New York, April 30.—Edward J. McKeever, acting head of the Brooklyn baseball club of the National league, died at his home in Brooklyn yesterday, a little more than a week after the passing of the president of the organization, Charles E. Ebbets. He was 66 years old. Influenza developing from a cold contracted while attending the funeral of Mr. Ebbets last Saturday was given as the cause of his death. Stephen McKeever, his brother, will assume the presidency although he is 71 years old and is not expected to take active charge of affairs.

BANK CLEARINGS IN EUGENE SET RECORD

Eugene, Or., May 1.—With a total of \$2,246,676.93 during April, bank clearings in Eugene set a new record for a single month, according to announcement by the Eugene clearing house association, representing the three local banks. The former high mark of \$2,195,338.51 was set last October.

February, March and April of the present year have all passed the two million mark in clearings.
