At Marion an achievement day is being celebrated with exhibits of school and club work.

At Sublimity the public school is putting on a parents' day to show the work of the boys and girls, both in their clubs and in their general school work.

Tonight Gervais union high school will stage a style show in charge of Miss Becker, teacher in the home economics department.

At Eldridge school a club exhibit and program will be put on tonight.

DULUTH SECOND TO N. Y. IN MARITIME ACTIVITIES

Duluth, Minn.—Although its harbor is closed approximately four months of the year by ice, Duluth is rated the second largest cargo-shipping port of the nation in the annual report of maritime commerce of the Duluth Superior harbor, issued here under direction of Major E. H. Marlow, of the United States engineer's office.

New York harbor only had more shipping than Duluth last year, and Los Angeles was third, according to the report. Then came Buffalo, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Ashland, O., and Boston Harbor, Mass.

Jerusalem, Palestine.—A farm school for Arab boys and a high school for Jewish children will soon be established at Tulkerem and Jerusalem, respectively, with the funds of the \$500,000 bequest of the late Sir Ellis Kadoorie, a Jewish philanthropist of Shanghai. Both schools will bear the name of the donor, who bequeathed one-third of his estate to the British government to be spent by it on the provision of schools in Palestine or Mesopotamia.

Nome, Alaska.—Fox farming is fast being adopted by prospectors and trappers of the Seward peninsula as an additional means of making a livelihood and promises good profits.

CIGARETTES FIND FAVOR WITH ITALIAN SMOKERS

Rome—Italian cigarettes and tobacco are now on sale in all the markets of the world, while the consumption and sale in Italy of home-produced smoking articles are increasing by leaps and bounds according to a report of the governmental tobacco monopoly.

Throughout Italy, it is stated, there is a growing tendency to abandon cigar smoking in favor of cigarette smoking and since imported cigarettes are quite expensive, the Italian monopoly is reaping the benefit of the change in smokers' tastes. The consumption of the average individual smoker has increased 79 per cent since before the world war.
