

PRINCE DRIVES OX WAGON THRU CAPETOWN TODAY

Capetown, Union of South Africa, May 1.—(By Associated Press)—The Prince of Wales today drove an ox wagon through the streets of Capetown accompanied by a procession of thousands of university students singing "For he's a jolly good fellow."

After this informal expedition the prince, fulfilling a scheduled program, was ceremoniously installed chancellor of the University of Capetown, a titular position he has occupied since the inauguration of the university in 1918. Although the prince danced late last night with his untiring energy, he was out early this morning and ran into a parade and demonstration of university students, including hundreds of girls, outside a government house.

The parade was led by a body of comic cavalry, armed with brooms, followed by an old-fashioned prairie schooner drawn by 12 oxen. The cheering students were singing a special song with the chorus, "Oh Edward, now you're south in the land of drought, don't be down in the mouth."

The prince, greatly amused, entered into the spirit of the demonstration, mounted an ox wagon alone, flicking the oxen with the whip and led the procession through the city.

The students sang and cheered unceasingly and the prince seemed to be quite in his element. The procession ended at the city hall, where the prince was formally installed chancellor of the university.

However, the festive spirit could not be entirely subdued and some "ragging" interrupted the ceremony. At one point a white hen wearing the university colors was shooed upon the stage by students.

DENVER POLICE FACING CHARGES OF CORRUPTION

Denver, Colo., May 1.—The defense for ten Denver policemen today began the task of clearing them of wholesale charges of bribery and graft in the performance of their duties made yesterday in a hearing before City Manager of Safety and Excise Reuben W. Hersey.

The prosecution in the case was closed late yesterday after a day of rapid fire testimony in which several alleged underworld characters were the accusers. The policemen, all members of the dry law enforcement squad, have been suspended from the police department while all the charges are being investigated in public hearings. The suspensions and the charges resulted from raids which repeatedly enmeshed in the net of the law some 200 underworld habitués on Good Friday, last.

Witnesses for the prosecution testified that the patrolmen were paid "protection money" by bootleggers and other underworld characters; that in some cases the accused policemen had assisted bootleggers in the preparation of their products and that the patrolmen of the "bootleg" squad participated with chorus girls in "wild parties" for which the refreshment of "strong waters" was furnished by bootleggers.

SUSPECT TAKEN IN CULVER CITY MURDER PUZZLE

Los Angeles, Cal., May 1.—E. A. Benedict of Culver City, a suburb, was arrested by deputy sheriffs early today on suspicion of the murder of Mrs. Lulee Untermyer, well known Culver City model, whose battered body was found near her home there last week.

With Benedict when he was arrested was L. J. Bass, Bass was taken into custody as a material witness.

Benedict showed no surprise. Officers said, and did not even ask the charge on which he was being arrested. He was held incommunicado at the county jail.

Investigators who traced the man's movements since the night of the murder said that a few hours before the time Mrs. Untermyer is believed to have been beaten to death, Benedict was borrowing an automobile with which to drive to Culver City and complaining that he had no money. The next day, they allege, he paid \$140 to rent an apartment and exhibited a large roll of bills.
