Public Concert Tomorrow

One of the most remarkable musical events ever offered, the Salem public will be the concert in the armory tomorrow evening when several hundred of the most prominent Salem musicians will give a joint concert. The affair is a special feature of Music week which is being observed through out the United States this week. Program numbers will be given by the Chertan band, the Apollo club, the MacDowell club, the two Willamette university glee clubs, the prize winning choruses, and by the Junior Rotary boys. Short talks on the significance of music week will be made by Mayor Giesy and Mrs. C. D. Thomas of Portland, president of the state music association.

The program for the evening will open with the ensemble singing of choruses of 250 voices. The entire affair is being handled by a group of Salem musicians who are interested in seeing Salem's music week a success. A sincere effort is being made to omit personalities.

Only a small charge of ten cents is being made for admittance to the concert to defray the cost of renting the armory and incidental connected therewith. Practically all of the organizations taking part in the program have already appeared on the concert stage during the past winter months.

The committee on conservation, headed by Mrs. F. A. Elliott of Salem, of the department of applied education of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, prepared a small folder just off the press in which an urgent plea is made for the protection of the natural scenery of the state. Prepared by Mrs. Elliott's committee the little bulletin is issued by J. A. Churchill, superintendent of public instruction, and will be given a wide distribution through the state.

In addition to a plea for the protection of the trees and forests the folder contains a special description of the way in which careless vandalism of wild flowers is resulting in the almost complete obliteration of many species. The lady slipper and the calypso, once plentiful, are now very rare, and there is a noticeable decrease in the amount of Oregon grape, red and yellow wild currant, spring, the lodendron and other shrubs and flowers native to Oregon. The bulletin advocates a campaign to save Oregon's native wild flowers.

CITIZENS OF TOLEDO PROTEST JAP LABOR

Toledo, Or., May 4.—Citizens of Toledo, at a mass meeting Friday adopted resolution protesting against reported plans of the Pacific Spruce corporation to employ Japanese laborers in its sawmill. Dean Johnson, vice-president of the corporation, explained that only a limited number of Japanese had been intended to be employed on work for which it was difficult to obtain white laborers. He said that in the mill's present plan for contracting with white labor no Japanese would be brought here.

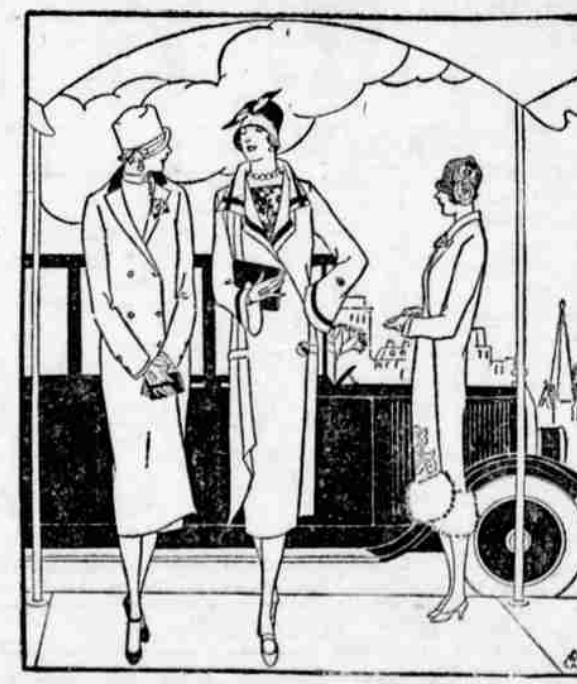
