

### LECTURER SAYS DISEASES HAVE MENTAL ORIGIN

Restating the principles of Christian Science, chiefly as laid down by Mary Baker Eddy, George Cook Shaw, C. S. H. of Chicago, spoke before a considerable crowd at the Grand theater last night.

"Many progressive medical doctors are recognizing more and more the mental origin of disease," said Mr. Shaw. "They have said, for example, that fear, worry, hatred and anger will produce sickness and they admit that many cases of illness are due to the emotions of the human mind. Christian Scientists would agree with the physicians at this point but would go beyond them in declaring that all disease has a mental cause. In doing so, however, they do not contend that all disease is the result of conscious fear, nor of willful sin, but that each of every disease or discordant condition of the material body there is some erroneous condition of thought which must be destroyed before there can be a permanent cure."

The speaker quoted from the Bible in support of Christian Science doctrine. "A good cause could only be manifested or expressed in a good effect," he said. "Hence we find in the first chapter of Genesis these positive and definite declarations: 'In the beginning God created the heaven and the earth.' 'And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good.' For the reason that effect must always be like cause, it follows with equal certainty that God being Spirit, His creation must be spiritual. Since God is Mind, infinite consciousness, that which thinks, He must of necessity be reflected by thought. The universe or creation of God is, therefore a thought-universe consisting of perfect spiritual thoughts or ideas. Thus it will be seen that the universe of God is no material, nor could it have been evolved from a material basis. The universe of God, of Spirit, is the limitless expression of Truth. It is the infinite revelation of Truth, the eternal activity of divine Mind as thought or thinking the sum-total of true or spiritual ideas.

### 3000 IN PRISON IN BULGARIA IS REVOLT RESULT

Sofia, May 7.—(A. P.)—More arrests have been made in consequence of revolutions at the trial of those charged with complicity in the Sveti Kral cathedral bombing tragedy.

There are now about 3000 persons in prison throughout Bulgaria, and the authorities state that the communist organization, which is blamed for the plot, is more far reaching than was at first supposed.

Nearly all members of the middle class who were involved in the movement have been apprehended, but several ranks of young idealistic communists are still undiscovered. Few peasants were imbued with the communist doctrine, the authorities say, and the majority of these arrests belong in towns where poverty and discontent offers a favorable field for the red propagandists.

The militia continues its close watch on all entering or leaving Sofia and several cases are reported of persons leaving bombs or explosives in the public gardens, fearing to be caught with them in their possession.

A remarkable feature of the recent events is the amount of army ammunition in the hands of the civilian population, and the authorities expect that further isolated acts of violence are bound to occur until the disarmament is general.

### May Festivities at Willamette to Open Midday Tomorrow

Coronation of Queen Lucia I, May queen for the 1925 May day festivities at Willamette university, will take place Friday afternoon, and will mark the beginning of May day and junior week end at the university.

A new location for the queen's court has been selected this year. It is being built on the lawn in front of Eaton and Waller halls, and the May dances will take place there. In case of rain they will probably be held in the gymnasium, it has been announced. The hour of beginning has been set at 1:30 p. m.

Senior girls, with the May queen and her two maids, Miss Jennelle Vandevor, and Miss Elizabeth McClure, will march to the court, take their seats there, and witness the coronation of the queen. Professor James T. Matthews will be master of ceremonies. Immediately following the coronation Miss Fay Spaulding will sing "May Mora."

The May dances will be a representation of the seasons of the year. There will be no interludes, one dance will merge into the next as one season of the year merges into another. The first to appear will be the asters, representing early autumn, followed shortly after by the autumn leaves. While the two are dancing the north wind, represented by Miss Mildred Herwig in a solo dance, will appear, whereupon the autumn leaves and asters fade out.

Following the north wind comes winter, represented by a dance of the snowflakes, who hurry away, however, when the north wind departs and the spirit of spring appears. Miss Lois Moorhead will represent the spirit of spring in a solo dance.

Winter is followed by spring, with dances by the forget-me-nots, the spring beauties and the violets, who follow one another until all are present before the queen's court. Following the comes summer, with dances of the

roses, the cornflowers and the butterflies. As soon as summer is completely entered and spring completely gone the sun goddess, represented by Miss Lillie Christopherson, will appear and sing a solo.

Winding of the May pole will be called the rainbow, streamers of numerous colors being used in the dance. Boys dressed in appropriate May day costumes, will take part in this part of the festivities. All other dances will be done entirely by girls.

Immediately following the May dances a baseball game between Willamette and Pacific will be staged on Sweetland field. The May queen and her two maids will attend the game in state.

In the evening the play, "Mr. Pim Passes by," will be presented in the Grand theater by the Junior class. The plot of the play is woven around the troubles caused by the absent minded Mr. Pim, who starts a certain married couple by absent mindedly removing that he knows her first husband, whom she had thought to be dead, to be alive. The play was given at the state penitentiary Wednesday night as a practice rehearsal.

Saturday morning tennis matches between the teams of Willamette and O. A. C. will be played on the Willamette courts. In the afternoon there will be a track meet on Sweetland field between the Willamette and Chemawa teams. In the evening a general program will be held in Willamette park, with the fountain playing and the university band playing several musical numbers.

Friday morning will be spent in finishing a general clean up of the campus, with a student lunch at noon.

The Wallulah, student annual published by the junior class, will be issued Friday forenoon.

Several hundred guests, including parents, friends and high school students, will be visitors on the campus during the festivities.

### OLYMPIC GAMES HEATHENISH SAY DUTCH SOLONS

The Hague, May 7.—(A. P.)—Olympic games are regarded as "heathenish" by some members of the Dutch parliament. This characterization was made during the debate in the lower chamber yesterday which preceded the defeat of the appropriation bill to provide expense of the met at Amsterdam in 1928.

The Cavalanist and Catholic deputies joined forces on the onslaught against the bill, which the liberals and socialists strongly supported it, emphasizing the benefits they said would accrue to Holland through the attraction there of thousands of foreign visitors.

Opponents of the bill held that no Christian government ought to tolerate revival of the games at all, even if the concession were made that the sabbath would not be desecrated. One exclaimed that he would rejoice to see Holland forever struck from the list of nations entering for the Olympics in which "nothing worthy is done for the glory of God."

Defeat of the bill 36 to 48, means the postponing of the sabbath day at least until October, as the elections are due within a few weeks and the new chamber will not meet until fall.

### WAGER BROKERS ARE ENJOINED

New York, May 7.—Two Wall Street brokerage houses, which figured prominently in the handling of last year election wagers, J. S. Friel & company and W. L. Jarnell & company, are temporarily enjoined from continuing in business.

The injunction was obtained yesterday from Supreme Court Justice McCrate of Brooklyn by Attorney General Ottinger. The firms are charged with fraudulent stock sales, and receivership for both is asked.

The attorney general said the action was the beginning of a campaign "to clean up the financial district."

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### BUSINESS HERE ACTIVE, FILINGS OF RECORD SHOW

Business activity in Salem and Marion county during the month of April, 1925, was greater than activity during any previous month of the year, and greater than any month of April since 1920, judging by the number of instruments filed. There were 531 instruments filed, of which 294 were deeds, 188 mortgages, and the rest sales, contracts, and other kinds of instruments. The number of instruments filed is regarded as a definite indication of business activity.

In January of the present year the number was 652, in February 668, in March 727, and in April of this year 730. In April 1920, the total reached 370.

"There is a more active movement in fact a property here than there has been for years," said a local realtor yesterday. Inquiries have been received since before the first of the year, and a large proportion of them mean business, it has been stated by Salem dealers.

Prospective buyers are coming chiefly from the east, and from California, local realty dealers say. Two or three have come from Idaho. Those coming from California are strong in their sentiment against that state, saying that times are very poor there and business opportunities lacking.
