

### BRITISH URGED TO GET CONTROL OF FOOD SUPPLY

London, May 8.—(By Associated Press)—The royal food commission which for many weeks has been hearing evidence regarding food prices, today issued its report—some majority and two minority.

The majority report, signed with various reservations by Chairman Auckland Geddes and other members of the commission recommends the establishment of a food council to maintain supervision over the staple food trade. This principal recommendation dominates most of the suggestions made.

The commission recommends that the food council closely watch future developments in connection with the importation of meat from Argentina.

They think it may become necessary for the government to intervene by acquiring a controlling interest in the British companies operating in Argentina or in some other way, at any time the supply of chilled and frozen meat from this source should be dominated by any adverse trading combination.

In connection with the baking and distribution of bread, the commission recommends that the food council investigating the apparent overlapping, maintain close supervision and intervene when prices tend to become unreasonable; watch the operations of the milling and price fixing associations and intervene if necessary in the interests of the consumer.

### FORMER OREGON CONGRESSMAN IS CALLED BY DEATH

Eugene, Or., May 8.—Hon. Robert M. Veatch, "Uncle Bob," died at the home of his son, H. H. Veatch, at Cottage Grove yesterday, at the age of 81 years. He was born in Illinois and crossed the plains to California in 1864, coming to Lane county in 1865.

He attended public school at Creswell, later attending Williams state university and the Oregon Agricultural college. He was admitted to the bar but was never a practicing attorney.

He was a staunch democrat and was elected to the lower house of the Oregon state legislature in 1882, and was re-elected in 1884. In 1886 he was sent to the senate, and was re-elected in 1890. He was appointed the first registrar of the Roseburg land office and under President Cleveland's second administration.

Ever since 1872, Mr. Veatch attended the state conventions of his party and in 1900 he was a delegate to the national democratic convention held in Kansas City.
