## STILL OWNER TO PROTEST EFFORT TO CONFISCATE

Deputy Sheriff Roy Bremmer this afternoon will go to Mt. Angel to bring to this city the balance of the paraphernalia used in the enormous still recently seized at Joe Walker ranch near that city.

Bremmer expects to take the remainder of the still property under protest, if not against open opposition on the part of Walker. He received a hint of this a few days ago when Walker declared that he would protest against any more of the property being taken, the protest being made on the advice of his attorney, Guy O. Smith.

The property still to be brought here includes 16 large mash vats, and some minor apparatus used in connection with the manufacture of the liquor.

It is believed that Walker will go no further than to make voluntary protest against the removal of the vats and apparatus when Bremmer appears on the scene.

It is understood the protest is made in connection with the motion filed by Smith to quash the case and have the property returned to the defendants on the ground that the officers acted without authority in making the raid, that the search warrant was insufficient, that the officers had no warrant to make the arrests and that they did not see a crime committed. The motion is now on appeal from justice court.

It is generally understood that Walker, owner of the ranch on which the still was seized, had no particular connection with the active operation of the plant, but merely rented his property to the moonshiners for the purpose of manufacturing liquor.

The still in question, officers say, was the largest ever seized in the west. Over 4500 gallons of mash were seized in the raid and several hundred gallons of liquor.

The coronation of Miss Lucia Card as Queen Lucia I took place shortly after 1:30 o'clock this afternoon and marked the beginning of May day festivities at Willamette university. ## CHANGES IN STATE COURT PROCEDURE CONFERENCE'S AIM

Henry E. McGinn, given by Mrs. McGinn and presented by D. Soils Cohen today, to the Multnomah Bar association, J. Kavanagh made the speech of acceptance and Albert B. Ridgway, president of the association, presided during the ceremony. The portrait was painted by Sidney Bell.

Supreme Justice Thomas McBride then took the chair. He and Associate Justice John L. Rand, and Circuit Judges Fred Wilson of The Dalles, C. M. Thomas of Medford and Walter H. Evans of Portland make up the judicial council.

Opposition to the proposal to adopt for the state circuit courts the practice now used in the federal courts of having the judge, instead of the attorneys, question prospective members of the jury, was voiced at the initial session of the judicial council.

The council called the meeting merely to hear suggestions, and will take no action. Whatever action the council decides upon will be taken in executive session at some future time.

R. B. Parsons of Bend said he was unalterably opposed to adopting the federal court system. Selection of the jury, he said, is one of the most important parts of a trial to the litigants.

Judge Skpworth of Eugene also opposed the proposal of the change from the present system, declaring that very little time is lost in selecting juries under it if the trial judge controls the case properly.

## CHECKER FANS OF VALLEY ARE TO VIE IN CITY

For the first time in 10 years Salem is to be the center of a big checker tournament, according to announcement made by Isadore Greenbaum, Salem's champion checker player, when on May 15, teams from Salem, Eugene and Albany, constituting the crack playing contingent of the Willamette valley will meet a team of 20 players from the Portland Chess and Checker club. The tournament will be purely a checker affair, with no chess games scheduled.

Forty of the fastest checker players in Oregon will engage with on this occasion at the chamber of commerce, the tourney to start at 8 o'clock in the evening and will be open to the public.

Eugene, Albany and Salem each will furnish five or six men, enough to make up the 20 players from the valley.

The Salem team so far selected will include Isadore Greenbaum of the firm of Rostein & Greenbaum, Prof. Laughlin of Willamette university, David Drager, county treasurer, W. P. Wright, auctioneer, and Henry Hill, employed at Upjohn's Gladiolus gardens.

Under the plan of the players will be split into five divisions four men in a division and each man will play eight games in his own division, two games with each man.

Ten years ago, when the last tournament was staged here, Portland played Salem and won. Both chess and checkers were combined in that tournament.

Salem has no chess and checker clubs, but there are clubs at Albany and Eugene. The Salem team has been picked for its ability and it is believed is made up of the best players in the town.
