

WOODS-LEWIS BATTLE IS BEST SEEN AT ARMORY

For six rounds Lewis ducked, sidestepped and outbit Spec Woods of Spokane and former holder of the Northwest welterweight title at the boxing show held at the armory last night. The bout could not be called a boxing match as the two fighters stood toe to toe during most of the fight and slugged each other with all that they had. In the earlier rounds it was all Lewis, Woods being unable to connect at all due to the clever ducking of his opponent.

Lewis outboxed and outbit Woods for six rounds, but in the last four Woods opened up and took the final round, earning a well deserved draw. Woods and Lewis gave the fight fans one of the best exhibitions yet held at the armory and the fans were on their toes from the opening bell until the last one. Just before the last, Billy Gardner, of Portland challenged the winner.

In-fighting by Woods gave Lewis the worst punishment he has had in any of his fights here. Lewis had the reach and was a little quicker than Woods but was up against one of the toughest boys yet seen in the ring here. The final round was the best of all as they stood up and hit each other with all that they had. Not one minute of the ten rounds did either of the fighters let up. Woods kept boring in and Lewis was there to meet him, neither fighter backing up.

Harold Reese, of Portland knocked out Slow York, of Eugene in the fourth round of a scheduled six round battle. Reese put York into the ropes and had it not been for the fans, York would have gone out of the ring. Up until that time it was about even although York had a little the best of it on aggressiveness.

Lon Perry, 125, of Salem, gave Jean Brittan a terrible beating and won the fight in the second frame of a scheduled four round go. Brittan was not out, but had received so much punishment that Louitt gave the fight to Perry. Brittan weighed in at 135 and Perry at 135.

In the opening preliminary, Rusty Green, 135, floored Arthur Mayor of Salem, twice in the second round. The referee gave the fight to Green as Mayor was severely punished and would have been unable to keep going. Mayor weighed in at 145. The crowd was not as large as at the last card but the armory will be overflowing if Woods and Lewis fight next time.

**STAGE IS SET FOR
INAUGURATION**

Berlin, May 9.—(A. P.)—From present indications the inauguration of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, as president of Germany, will be run off without a hitch next Tuesday.

Although the communists are preparing protest demonstrations on Monday, the date of his arrival from Hanover, these will be held in working class sections of the city, far removed from the route to be traveled by the president-elect's automobile. For this reason, there is little fear of a clash between the communists and the field marshal's well wishers.

The decision of the republican, the republican organization, not to participate in the welcome is considered politically unwise in many republican circles as abandoning the field entirely to the nationalists.

On the other hand, it was received with a sigh of relief by those arranging the welcome, as eliminating a possible source of trouble with the nationalist patriotic societies.

Phoenix, Ariz., May 9.—Eighty-eight strikeouts in 44 innings of baseball is the record set by Ivan Green, pitcher for the Phoenix high school nine. His latest feat was performed yesterday, when he whiffed twenty batters in a nine-inning game with Tucson high school. In the 55 innings he pitched, preceding yesterday's game, Green struck out 52 batters.

Narrowly heading off a ninth inning rally, the Willamette university baseball team defeated Pacific university 5 to 4 yesterday afternoon on the local diamond in the closest game that the Bearcats have yet played this season. A feature of the game was the beautiful placing of hits by the Pacific aggregation.

Isham, Willamette third baseman, scored first in the initial frame when he walked to first, was advanced to second on Towne's sacrifice, stole third and romped home on an overthrow to third.

The Bearcats were never headed, but Pacific came dangerously close in the ninth when Cameron drove out a home run with one man on. From that point, however, they were successfully held in check by Kalahan, who pitched the entire game for the Bearcats. Tucker pitched for Pacific.

Gibbons said he is in good condition now and weighs 188 pounds. He has been taking light workouts daily, including a morning round of golf or a run through the country and gymnasium exercises in the afternoon.

At his Atlantic City camp, which has been established by Eddie Kane, his manager, Gibbons

will take things easy, for a week or two and then windup with ten days of intensive training. Earl Blue, St. Paul middleweight, will go with Gibbons tonight as one of his sparring partners. Later Jimmy Delaney, St. Paul light heavyweight, will join the party.

Stella R. Harlow, was married to Covey M. Terry. The ceremony was performed by Rev. E. H. Shanks of the First Baptist church.

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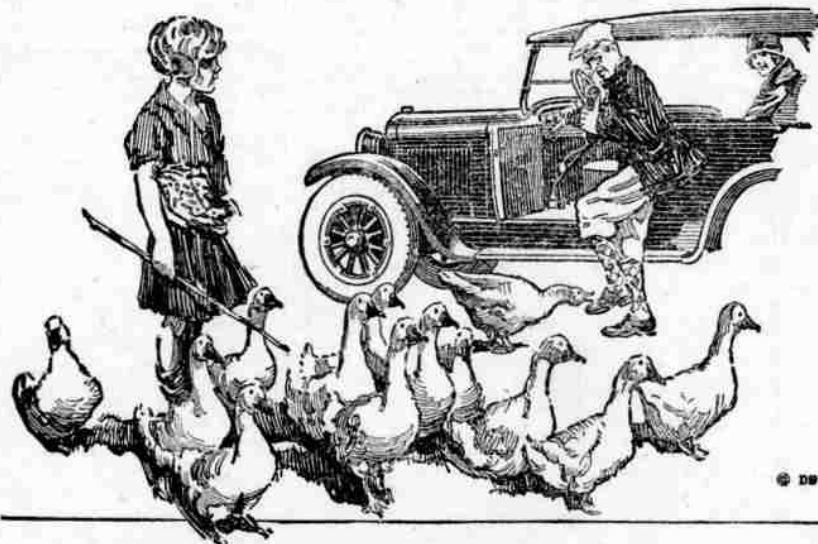
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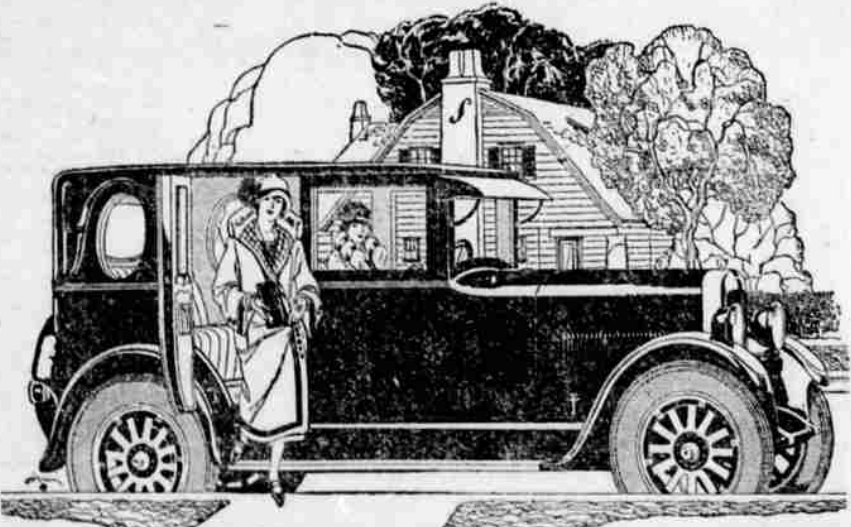
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
