HOME PRODUCTS DAY DRAWS BIG SATURDAY CROWD

Silverton, Or., May 11.—(Special.)—Silverton's first Oregon Products day held Saturday was very successful and drew large numbers of visitors from Salem, Scotts Mills, Mt. Angel and other surrounding communities. The American flag and the crowds on the streets gave Silverton a Fourth of July air.

Although there was no outlined program of parades and addresses, the visitors and citizens found ample interest in the various window displays and "open houses" at the different places of business. For many, the day's celebration began with the annual Oregon Industries dinner served by the American Legion Auxiliary at Trinity church. This drew 200 diners. The dining room was very attractive with a profusion of spring flowers. The products used for dinner were donated by the Silverton merchants. The menu consisted of the following: Rolls, donated by Julius Alm & Sons; baked ham by Garver & Graham, City Meat company and Valley Market; scalloped potatoes by 26th Century and Benton's grocery; baked beans by Milliken & Milliken; fruit salad by Benton's grocery, Syring & Banks and Kinney & Porter; Red Rock cottage cheese by Garver & Graham; jams by Bivens grocery; bread by Silverton bakery; butter by Silver Creek creamery, prunes by N. Digerness; cookies by J. Wolfard company; ice cream by George Steelhammer and Olsen pharmacy; sugar by Benton's grocery; coffee by Julius Alm & Sons; cream by Silverton Creamery company.

The windows and stores offered much of interest to visitors. At the H. L. Still Furniture company store the iris show from the gardens of Dr. R. E. Kleinsohn and Rhodin Cooley, and the basket weaving by F. E. Allen attracted much attention. Perhaps the Madame Cheron, a delicate lavender and white, and El Dorado, a bronze and blue, and Mamie, Gaudichon, a gorgeous purple, brought forth most admiration from those attending. Twenty-three varieties of irises were shown.

The Ames hardware store windows also drew large crowds. Here a miniature of the Silverton park with its swimming pool, its fountain and monument, its skating rink, its swings and its pump, was a continuous source of amusement for passers-by. The Silverton Food Products windows at Steelhammer's drug store and at Kinney & Porter, the Silverton Creamery & Ice company window at Kinney & Porter, and the Silverton Electric store all came in for their share of favorable comment. Another window whose display, although not of Oregon products, still helps to put Oregon on the map, was that of the Silverton postoffice. Here Virgil Kruske, of the postoffice force, had a small part of his extensive stamp collection on display. Mr. Kruske has stamps representing very nearly every country in the world besides the numerous different issues of the United States.

NEWHOUSE SAYS EUROPE OFFERS PRUNE MARKET

Dallas, Or., May 11.—M. J. Newhouse, manager of the North Pacific Co-operative Prune Growers Exchange, spoke Saturday afternoon before oak county prune growers on the market situation and other points of interest to prune growers taken from his recent trip to European and eastern markets.

Mr. Newhouse repeatedly stressed the necessity of keeping up the quality of the Oregon prunes in the entire drying and packing process. England and the Scandinavian countries offer a market that can be developed. Germany can not be looked to in the near future as an important market for any but cheap prunes.

In touching on the domestic market Mr. Newhouse declared that the co-operative organization should plan on sending a representative through a great deal of the eastern territory developing one-car and larger markets, keeping brokers active and making reliable distributing connections. The chair store organizations in the middle west are becoming one of the best marketing outlets for Oregon prunes, he stated.

In speaking of Denmark, the center of co-operating marketing, Mr. Newhouse declared that not the co-operative plan, but the standard of quality maintained in the products had spelled success. He spoke of his visit to the Hamburg packing plant of Grimm-Smith, a German concern which buys large quantities of California prunes of small size, re-processes them by steeping in boiling water and secures an increase in weight and a larger size. The prunes are then re-shipped throughout the world.

In speaking of the English market particularly, Mr. Newhouse declared that the co-operative organization must be prepared to meet prime competition and keep its prunes and brand on the market, relying on the average season sales to hold the return where it should be for the grower.

The managers of packing plants voted to meet in Portland, June 16, with the Portland chamber of commerce to continue plans for uniform packing. The secretaries of the locals will meet with them.
