## SILVERTON WINS IN TRACK MEET OVER MILL CITY

Silverton, Or., May 12.—(Special.)—That Silverton high school has very good track material was conclusively proved here Saturday afternoon when they defeated Mill City with a score of 53 to 28. The Silverton boys showed considerable speed and will put up a good fight at the county meet at Salem next Saturday and at the northwest meet at Pacific university a week from Saturday.

The events in the meet between Mill City and Silverton, Saturday, were as follows:

50-yard dash—Dwight Kircher, Silverton, first in 5.45 seconds; Cathwood, second; and Flock, third, both of Mill City.

## GOVERNOR ASKS DALLAS TO BACK FLAX PROJECTS

Dallas, Or., May 12.—Governor Walter M. Pierce was the speaker of the day Monday at the Dallas chamber of commerce luncheon. He was welcomed by a large turnout of local business and professional men.

Governor Pierce spoke on the flax industry, declaring that he was optimistic for its success in this section and asked the support of local men in encouraging it.

He also discussed the flax retting and scutching plant at the penitentiary and attention that had been given it under his administration. He indicated that an increase in the capacity of this plant would be considered as soon as the Dominion Linnens' proposed mill was assured, as it would need approximately 4000 acres more flax.

Next Monday, Ralph E. Williams, republican national committeeman for Oregon, and Dean Collins, Portland newspaperman, will be the speakers. Both are former Dallas men. On May 25, B. F. Irvine, editor of the Oregon Journal, will be the speaker.

## COUNTY SCHOOLS ARE TO COMPETE HERE SATURDAY

With Salem schools entered for the first time in many years, the annual county track meet will be held on Willamette field next Saturday, those in competition being units surrounding Stayton, Turner, Woodburn and Silverton, in addition to the Salem schools.

Leslie Sparks will select the Salem team in trout probably tomorrow. It is understood that Salem high school cannot be entered officially and only its gymnasium classes will compete.

Leaders of the various sections will be Robert Goetz of Silverton, Frank Fagan of Woodburn, J. R. Blidgood of Turner, O. V. White of Stayton and H. L. Van Orsdel of Salem. A silver cup will go to the winning school and ribbons to the place winners.

This year a new system of classification will be tried out being held six divisions based on four different points. The points are grade, age, height and weight. All grades are eligible to compete from the fourth grade up through the high school. This classification will be applied to both boys and girls this year. If the new classification proves a success with this year's experiment, next year it is the plan to have separate classification for both boys and girls.

On May 23 the county baseball championship will be played off on Silver Falls diamond at Stayton. The semi-finals will be played off this week in the north end with Aurora and Mt. Angel playing for the north end championship of the grade schools and Woodburn and Gervais high schools for the high school championship in the high schools.

In the south end Stayton won the high school championship and Agnewville the grade school championship.

The county declamatory contest was staged here at the high school building Saturday night with Floyd Massey of Stayton and Fernie Wadsworth of Gervais winning first and second places in the high school division. Colem Simia, Haysville, and Zoe Cutler of Gervais, took first and second places in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades and Mae Coffey, Silverton, and Dorris Walling, Jefferson, taking first and second places in the third, fourth and fifth grades.

The judges were Miss Beth G. Savage, H. E. Brown, U. of G. and C. B. Mitchell, O. A. C. Presentation of the medals was made by Robert Goetz.
