"This will always be a big fruit center," said Pierce, "but it is diversified, farming, with at least one crop which we can depend upon the year in and year out. I feel that the linen industry is an industry that will mean millions to this community. This mill is only one of many that ought to come here."**

Last fall Bloch rushed into the office of a local law enforcement official.

"I demand protection," Bloch declared. "These blankety-blank fellows around here are telling the story about town that I am peddling booze and I won't stand for it. I'll show these birds how they can handle my name about."

"I demand that you issue me a star at once and I'll show those fellows up. I can turn in a bunch of bootleggers and moonshiners that will make them gasp."

The local official, having heard some of the same gossip regarding Bloch about which Bloch was complaining, useless to state, did not issue the star.

## BIDS OPENED ON NEW Y BUILDING

Contractors' bids for construction of new Salem Y. M. C. A. building were opened at 11 o'clock this morning and presented to the board of directors at a meeting this noon. The bids will not be acted upon for 3-4 days, it was indicated.

For general construction, exclusive of plumbing, heating and wiring, 19 bids were entered by as many contracting firms. The lowest bid was put by Wechter & Hughes of Salem, whose bid was \$53,329.

For heating the lowest bid was entered by Sturgis & Sturgis of Portland, their bid being \$16,625. P. M. Barr was the lowest local bidder on heating, Barr's figure being \$18,309. For plumbing Sturgis & Sturgis also bid lowest, the amount being \$5330. The lowest local bid came from Joe Bernard. His offer was for \$2400.

For wiring the Morrison Electric company of Portland came lowest, with the Salem Electric company the lowest local bidder. The Portland firm bid \$2595, the local firm \$2697.90.

Work on the building is expected to begin immediately after the contracts are let.

## JEWELERS TOLD GOVERNMENT TO KEEP HANDS OFF

They will be reduced more than \$200,000,000 more in 1925.

"I believe the jewelers pay a disproportionate amount of our present taxes," said Hawley. "The individual jeweler is subject to an income tax, the same as any other individual. Aside from this he is forced to pay an excise tax, which is now caused by the four times as high as the taxes on other luxuries." The excise tax on jewelry has been reduced one-half during the past year, he stated, and will probably be abolished completely within another year. The former tax was 5 per cent.

Carl T. Griffe, Portland jeweler, spoke before the convention on the subject. "What the Association is doing for the Jeweler," said D. H. Hoptstadt of Oneida, New York, gave a speech on the subject, "What the Jeweler Can Learn from the Harvard Research Bureau Reports."

Reports of committees and round table discussions occupied the remainder of the forenoon.

## KLAMATH FALLS RAIL ROW ALIVE

Klamath Falls, Or., May 12.—Another attempt to grant the Straborn railroad franchise rights to cross Klamath Falls Street without the common user clause, was made at the city council meeting last night, when a franchise resolution was adopted by a vote of three to two. Mayor Fred Goddard announced that he would promptly veto the resolution by next Monday night.

R. C. Grossbeck, representing the railroad, declared that "hadn't we been frozen over 100 years before we will grant a common user over any of our lines."

Mayor Goddard urged the council to take steps to have the Interstate Commerce Commission intervene on behalf of the city of Klamath Falls in the event the Straborn line sells out to some larger railroad. The city of Klamath Falls gave Robert E. Straborn \$300,000 when he first started his railroad construction in this county and if plans to sell to the Southern Pacific or some other road, the mayor wants the city to get back its \$300,000 which it invested as a partner with the pioneer railroad builder.

## Fisk Asserts Secrecy Talk Is Unfounded

Eugene, Or., May 12.—Denial that there was a note of secrecy at the meeting of the board of regents of the University of Oregon on May 2 was issued here today by State Senator Fred Fisk, a member of the board.

"No member thought of any secrecy, and nothing was thought or said concerning the proceedings of the day in connection with holding publicity of the same. The regents, neither at this meeting, nor at any meeting, have exercised a censorship over the news that is given out concerning their proceedings, or any other thing," Fisk asserted.

"At this meeting, the board met, transacted its business, with no thought of publicity or non-publicity, did its duty as it was seen and went home. At no time during the session was the board in executive session, consequently anyone so desiring could have been present."

"No politics of any sort whatsoever have entered into the board meetings or been any part of the board's procedure."

## COOLIDGE HOPES FOR SUCCESS OF REFUNDING PLAN

Washington, May 12.—(A. P.)—President Coolidge hopes the negotiations now progressing in Paris and Washington of the French debt settlement question will lead to some definite plan for a refunding agreement.

It apparently is too early to make positive predictions whether this hope is to be realized, but Mr. Coolidge describes the discussions as having at least entered the stage of "negotiations" which he applied in diplomacy to describe only definite and concrete international exchanges.

White house and other officials would not say today whether they regarded the statement made by Finance Minister Caillaux to the French parliamentary finance commission as indicating the negotiations had entered a more definite phase.

The American viewpoint on that subject, probably will not be formed until official reports of the statement are received from Paris.

## GENERAL MURRAY IS DEAD

Washington, May 12.—Major General Arthur Murray, retired, former commander of the western department died at his home here today after a prolonged illness. He entered the army from Missouri in 1870 and retired on account of age in 1925.

## WOMAN HELD ON MURDER CHARGE

Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, May 12.—A charge of first degree murder was filed today against Mrs. H. J. Miles, who has confessed to dynamiting a shack in the rear of her home here in which her husband was asleep Sunday night. Miles died soon afterward.

In a newspaper statement today Mrs. Miles declared she bought the dynamite with the intention of blowing up the shack to prevent her husband taking it away to go with another woman. She said she found a note from a woman to her husband Sunday evening, and that this has caused her to set off the explosive. She lit the fuse, she said, and she stood by until just before the explosion.

Mrs. Herman Walters, a neighbor, said yesterday she had written notes to Miles with the intention that Mrs. Miles should find them, because she had evidenced jealousy of their friendship.
