

### VON HINDENBURG GRAPPLES WITH DAWES SCHEME

Berlin, May 14.—(By Associated Press).—President Von Hindenburg grappled with another vexing program today, his third in office, featured chiefly by a reception to the diplomatic corps with Charge d'Affaires Warren Robbins representing the United States.

During his reception of a railway delegation yesterday, the Dawes reparations plan was brought before the new president for the first time. Carl Stieker, managing director of railways, informed him that under the Dawes scheme the roads were obliged to bear a large part of the burden of the Versailles treaty. In reply the president expressed confidence, that despite the difficulties confronting them, the railways would bring in greater returns to assist in meeting the nation's international obligations.

His meeting with General Von Seeckt and Admiral Zenker, as chief of the defense forces, was touched with some pathos, the president telling them that the occasion "fills my old soldier's heart with pride and sorrow."

He paid tribute to "the indefatigable work which you carried out under the most distressing conditions" and assuring them of his support, concluded:

"May you also be successful in the future in making the re-wehr an effective instrument for peace for which only it is intended."

Several high German officials planned to participate in the reception to the diplomats today including Chancellor Luther, former Minister Stresemann, executive Secretary Meisener, Foreign Under Secretary Von Schubert and the official diplomatic introducer, Von Guelch.

### ASSERT SLAYER ADMITTED ACT

Hutchinson, Kan., May 14.—Affidavits by two Kansas City men who say Frank Leonard, a Kansas City switchman acquitted by a jury here last fall of a murder charge in connection with killing of W. E. Gibbs and Cliff was veteran, admitted the murder in his presence, were filed in district court Wednesday. They were filed in connection with an amended motion for a new trial for Dr. Kenn B. Uhls of Kansas City, convicted of killing Gibbs. Dr. Uhls is at liberty on \$20,000 bonds pending appeal to the supreme court.

According to the affidavits, Leonard declared he told Dr. Uhls of his act and threatened to kill him and all members of his family if he divulged the act.

### Second Wonder Dog Chooses Salem for His Permanent Home

A second "wonder dog" stepped into the limelight today as a result of a story related by J. S. Poisal, official at the Salem auto camp grounds.

The original "wonder dog" already had his home near Salem at Silverton, to be exact—and returned to it from a distance half-way across the continent, having been left there by accident on an auto trip his owners were taking across the country. Poisal tells of a dog that didn't originally belong here. In fact he only stopped at the camp grounds for a week while passing through with a party from Iowa, but 19 days after leaving he returned and has been here ever since.

Even a dog knows how to pick out the best place to live, says Poisal.

The animal, which was an Alredale, belonged to J. E. Watson, who, with his wife and son and his son's wife, was passing through Salem a month ago on their way east from Long Beach, California. They expected to stop at their former home in Iowa, go on to Washington, D. C., and eventually complete the circuit back to Long Beach. They spent a week at the camp here.

"He was an awfully nice dog," said Poisal this morning. "He and I got to be great friends."

Just when and where he left Watson is a matter of conjecture. All Poisal knows is that 19 days after the party had left the dog came back to stay. He looked around the camp, apparently looking for somebody, but eventually

decided to remain with the camp officials.

"I could have given him away 20 times," says Poisal. "I could have sold him for \$25."

The dog has finally been given to O. E. Scott, who lives on the Jefferson road, and who is working on the new community house at the auto camp grounds, and who has a number of youngsters who immediately welcomed the dog to their home as only youngsters can. They have named him "Mike."

He was given to Scott—or rather to the younger generation of Scotts—with the understanding that if the original owners of the animal ever appear Mike will be returned. No doubt is held by any of the parties, however, that Watson will have to come to Salem to live if he expects to keep Mike in his household.

### TRAINS CRASH; THREE DIE

Terre Haute, Ind., May 14.—Three persons are reported killed and several injured in a collision between Pennsylvania railroad passenger train No. 6, eastbound, and a freight train, near Martinsville, Ill., 16 miles west of here.

Those reported killed were Dan Walsh and George H. Muench, both engineers, and William Zimmerman, fireman. Two engines pulling the passenger train and six coaches were derailed.
