

MEMORIAL DAY OBSERVED UPON FRIDAY, MAY 29

Memorial day, 1925, has been set for Friday, May 29. There will be memorial day exercises in all schools of the city in the forenoon, with at least one speaker from the GAR and one from the American Legion at each school.

All graveyards in the city will be visited in the forenoon by members of the Women's Relief corps. Special services will be held in the City View cemetery.

At 1 p. m. water services will be held by members of the Women's Relief corps in honor of naval heroes. The services, which involve a regular ritual, will probably take place on the Marion Polk county bridge. As part of the ritual flowers will be thrown upon the water.

The grand parade of military, fraternal and civic organizations of the city will start at 2 p. m. at Marion Square. Colonel Carl Abrams has been appointed grand marshal. Aides to the grand marshal will represent every military organization of Salem, as follows:

DOUBLE STILL AT JAMAICA

Benny Marinelli, jockey, may die, it was feared, as the result of his fall on Upton at the first turn at Jamaica race track. Just after he and his mount fell, M. Fator, on Firearm, came galloping through the dust cloud, toppling into Marinelli and his mount. The photographer snapped this picture at that moment, with the two horses and two men on the ground. Marinelli's skull was crushed and he was injured internally. Fator's collarbone was broken. The picture is one of the most unusual ever made on a race track.

WASHINGTON DEFEATS WILLAMETTE IN TENNIS

The University of Washington won 5 matches out of 5 in the tournament held between Willamette and Washington teams on the local courts yesterday. Emmel, ranking Willamette man, had an off day, but the remainder of the team; aggregation was going at its top form, and all declared themselves satisfied with the results. Hesketh, the most experienced man of the Washington team, was playing in third place because he has been showing erratic strokes this season. He was going well yesterday.

DuBoise and Dranga both won letters in yesterday's matches. Hesketh defeated Walsh 6-3, 6-2. In doubles Hesketh and Dranga defeated Emmel and Mickey 7-5, 6-3. DuBoise and Livingston defeated Walsh and Emmel 6-4, 6-4.

UNIVERSITY STUDENTS ELECT NEW OFFICERS

Eugene, Ore., May 15.—Walter Malcolm of Portland was elected to the presidency of the associated students of the university of Oregon at the annual election held yesterday. He defeated his sole opponent, Steele Winterer by 326

votes. Approximately 1540 students voted at the election. One of the closest races in years developed in the field for the editorship of the Oregon Emerald, student daily. Edward Miller won by an eight vote margin over Harold Kirk. James Case and Jalmer Johnson were the other two candidates. Freddie Martin, for yell king; Deloris Pearson, for student body secretary, and Elizabeth Cady, for editorship of the Oregonian, were winners without competition. Paul Ager defeated Bob McCabe for the vice-presidency of the student body.

STROLLERS ORCHESTRA TO OPEN AT DREAMLAND
