To the Editor:—I read with pleasure in your noble paper, letters in your Open Forum column of Will E. Suppose we paint the greatest picture that has or ever will be painted on those billboards on the right side of the road, for the light is where it belongs, and that means both in the world and in those beautiful scriptural verses:

1—"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given."  
2—"Behold there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem saying, 'where is he that is born king of the Jews?'"  
3—"And lo, a voice from heaven says, 'this is My beloved Son in whom I am well pleased.'"  
4—"Behold the lamb of God which taketh away the sins of the world."  
5—"Ye must be born again."  
6—"Then were there two thieves crucified with him, one on the right hand, one on the left."  
7—"And He was numbered with the transgressors."  
8—"Then said Jesus, 'Father forgive them for they know not what they do.'"  
9—"Whoever will may come without money and without price."  
10—"Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."  
11—"Our Father who art in heaven."  
12—"For the Lord giveth them light."
