

BAPTISTS FIRM FOR CREATION FROM GENESIS

Memphis, May 15.—(A. P.)—Failure of the committee appointed to prepare a declaration of faith and message to agree unanimously resulted yesterday in the Baptist convention being called on to decide whether the theory of evolution should be discussed in its statement of belief.

With one dissenting member, the committee, headed by E. J. Mullins, Louisville, suggested that the convention adopt as its statement on the belief of man's creation.

"Man was created by the special act of God as recorded in Genesis."

Dr. C. P. Stealy, Oklahoma, offered as a substitute to the declaration, this statement:

"We believe that man came into the world by direct creation of God and not by evolution."

The convention declined the substitute by a vote of 2,013 to 959 after more than 2 hours discussion.

Although the statement of the fundamental basis of Baptists fails to refer to the evolution directly, the theory is based in a statement appended to the doctrinal declaration. This statement was reported by the full committee.

The statement holds that while science is important, that its findings are needed and welcomed, it is separate from religion and must be kept separate.

SECOND VETO FOR STRAHORN

Klamath Falls, Ore., May 15.—For the second time within a month, Mayor Fred R. Goddard yesterday vetoed a councilmanic resolution which sought to give the Strahorn railroad an exclusive franchise to cross Sixth street. The mayor declared that he would never sign a resolution which would tend to permit on railroad to "bottle up" the entrance to the city. He also urged the city not to give the Strahorn line any permits or easements of any kind until the city's \$300,000 interest in the road should be protected against a "bankruptcy sale," or any other sale of the Strahorn road.

Coincident with this executive veto, it became known that Hill line surveyors are planning to locate a line across upper Klamath lake, which would put the new road nearly four miles from Klamath Falls if such a route were taken. It is believed here that the line is being surveyed to protect the Hill line in the event that Klamath Falls does not give it a feasible entry into the city.

Mr. Giddings said he had the signatures of about 1000 business men and other citizens of the community on his petition who were not satisfied with their present banking connections because of the long distance of the banks from their district. He said his proposed bank would have a capitalization of \$50,000 and surplus of \$10,000, but that he personally subscribe to a great amount of stock.

BOARD UPHOLDS DENIAL OF BANK AT ROSE CITY

The state banking board unanimously upheld Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, in its denial of a petition of R. C. Giddings to establish a bank on Sandy boulevard, in the Rose City park district of Portland. Giddings had appealed to the board from Bramwell's denial.

Bramwell told the board that to operate successfully it would be necessary for a new bank to accumulate in a short time deposits in excess of \$500,000 and he doubted if this could be done.
