Peare, who are sentenced to be hanged at the state penitentiary next Friday, the former for the murder of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Elba Covell of Bandon, and the latter for the murder of his wife. Both are from Coos county. Covell is a helpless paralytic and Peare is an old man nearly 70. Governor Pierce has instructed Warden Dalrymple to prepare for the hangings and it is not believed the pleas now reaching the governor for clemency will be heeded.
