## NINE NATIONS ASKED TO PAY OBLIGATIONS

creasing pressure from leaders in congress and others who opposed any longer delay in resolving the obligations of the borrowing nations to pay.

During this period France, in particular, has made a succession of diplomatic gestures indicating that she would enter into discussions at some unnamed future date under unspecified conditions, but not one concrete proposal emerged from all the discussion.

The debt commission, despite the repeated delays, has adhered until the present, to the policy of awaiting proposals from abroad, taking the view that the debtors should have plenty of time to turn themselves around financially before they could properly be pressed for a settlement.

In the opinion of Washington, the acute reconstruction period now passing or has been passed, however and with the operation of the Dawes plan it is felt here that Europe is in a position to commit itself definitely to payment.

During the period of waiting fruitful proposals came from exactly half of the 10 principal debtors. Those who voluntarily entered into negotiations which resulted in funding agreements were Great Britain, Hungary, Finland, Lithuania and Poland.

Congress has charged the debt commission with responsibility for keeping the subject before those countries which have not settled, and the recent notification to the five remaining debtors, though sent through the state department, emanated from the debt commission. It is understood that the communication to Mr. Herriek dispatched last week, instructed him to say that the settlement made with Great Britain was regarded here as a desirable standard for other nations.

If paid today, the debts of the nine defaulted governments would amount to \$7,100,975,995 and the total is increasing daily as the interest column mounts.

The treasurer's balance sheet as of today, shows these figures: Belgium, principal and interest, \$580,502,933. Czechoslovakia, \$117,679,025. Estonia, \$17,794,020. France, \$4,210,556,948. Italy, \$2,138,543,852. Greece, \$17,525,000. Latvia, \$6,352,139. Rumania, \$46,508,861. Yugoslavia, \$5,412,597. Grand total \$7,100,975,995.

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## Sande Comes Back with Victory



SARAZEN, SANDE UP, WINS

When Earl Sande, world's premier jockey, was almost fatally crushed by falling horses during a race at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., last year, it was predicted he would never ride again. But the courage that brought him back from the gates of death was not broken. The first mount he accepted was Mrs. William K. Vanderbilt's crack "Sarazen," believed by many to be the best three-year-old on the American turf. Riding with consummate skill at Havre de Grace, Md., Sande finished two and a half lengths ahead of "Big Blaze" in the Newark Handicap, breaking the track record for the six furlongs.

## THIRD LUMBER MILL FOR BEND

Bend, Ore., May 16.—A third sawmill to cost a million and a half dollars is about to be built in Bend, according to a story being published in the Central Oregon Press today.

The promotion of the mill in question is nothing of a particularly new or late enterprise, according to the story, but one that has been in the working for many months. The development of this enterprise has advanced to the point of securing a right of way from the timber lands to Bend and a mill site in Bend which have been secured. This land in question, is said to be the holdings of the Johnson Lumber company, located in the Sisters district and consists of timber of sufficient quantity to run the mill from ten to fifteen years. The approximate mileage of this timber land is from fifteen to twenty-two miles from the mill.

The owners of the timber tract have been busy for a long time in purchasing timber lands and blocking off preparatory to cutting.

Ora Johnson, one of the promoters of this enterprise, has been in Europe for some time financing this proposition.

New Incorporations Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, is one of the incorporators of the Continental Mortgage company, which filed articles today with the state corporation department. Its capital is \$50,000 and its offices will be in Portland. O. B. Robertson of Portland, former state senator and former state bank examiner, and Henry Oliver Ritz of New York are the other incorporators. The firm will do all the ordinary business relating to mortgages and loans.

Medford selects site for new high school Medford, Ore., May 16.—By a record breaking vote, the largest ever cast in a city election, the people of Medford yesterday selected the Holly street, over the Pacific and Eastern site for the erection of the new \$15,000 high school. It was a victory of West Medford over East Medford, after a week's whirlwind campaign of exceptional excitement and personal bitterness. The final vote was 1,603 for the Holly street and 1,172 for the Pacific and Eastern, a majority for the former of 431 votes.

Oregon to oppose Priest Rapids dam Portland, Or., May 16.—Oregon will oppose the construction of the projected Priest Rapids dam in the Columbia river by seeking an injunction according to a wire sent to Washington, D. C., late yesterday following the monthly meeting of the state fish commission. The wire carried the signature of F. P. Kendall, chairman of the commission.

Due to the size of the proposed dam the commission does not believe that a fish ladder could successfully be built over it.

Scotts Mills grade schools graduation Scotts Mills, May 16.—Graduation from grade schools was completed here last night. Commencement in high school will take place June 11.

There was no commencement ceremony for the grade school graduates, all ceremonies being held at the time of the May festival two weeks ago. Some 10 pupils graduated from grade school. Clarkston Hinchshaw of Portland, yearly meeting superintendent of the Friends church for the Pacific coast, will give the commencement for the high school.
