# WOODBURN HIGH TAKES COUNTY TRACK CONTEST

The county public school track meet was run off Saturday afternoon on a sloppy, muddy field, despite the rain which fell during most of the meet. High honors were taken by the Woodburn high school, together with a beautiful loving cup.

Dwight Kircher of the Silverton high school was the outstanding star of the meet although the Woodburnites were victorious. His brother, Lloyd Kircher, was a close second.

Dwight Kircher carried off the first place honors in the 50-yard, 100-yard and 440-yard dashes, as well as the hurdles. He also tied Ballard of Woodburn for first place honors in the pole vault, and was second in the broad jump. His brother, Lloyd, took the honors in the mile run by a good margin. No records were kept of the time made in the runs and dashes due to the sloppy condition of the field.

The Woodburn representatives carried off all of the points in the baseball throw for girls. In the F class, the biggest grade, Margaret Webrum won easily when she threw the ball 188 feet, 3 1/2 inches. Mildred Langberg won the class B with 176 feet, 10 inches. Joyce Brannum won the class D by throwing the ball 147 feet, 5 inches. Dalores McKinnon took the C class when she hurled the spheroid 152 feet. Irene Wolf won B class with 125 feet, 10 inches, and Cecelia Van Bammie, A class, with 103 feet.

**MILL CITY FISHERMEN WANT TROUT IN SANTIAM**

Mill City, Or., May 18.—Fishermen of this city and surrounding territory are at last taking action to try and secure from the state fish commission a yearly supply of young trout to be planted in the Santiam river and tributaries. Petitions are being circulated for signature and will be presented to the commission to show the sentiment of the people hereabouts, including taxpayers and sportsmen.

Up to about 1920, the stream was stocked each year, but since that time has been neglected, and with the largely increased number of fishermen who yearly make their headquarters, the streams are rapidly being depleted, and immediate action will be necessary if the sport is to be continued. With the opening of the Detroit highway, which is scheduled within the next six weeks, an increased number of fishermen will be coming to this territory.

## CONFESSION OF CONVICT PROBED

Warden Dalrymple of the state penitentiary has received from Leonard McShane, chief of police at Sacramento, a request that Dalrymple ascertain from C. R. Moore, penitentiary prisoner who has confessed to the murder of Harry Brown in the Sacramento in September, 1923, the license number of the automobile driven by Moore at that time.

Moore, who was sent here from Eugene for larceny of an automobile, on May 1 signed a statement declaring that he was guilty of the Sacramento crime. His wife also signed the statement, confessing that she was driving the automobile for him at the time of the murder.

California authorities have not yet decided whether they will take Moore to Sacramento to be tried for the murder.
