Crowley, Ore., May 19.—Mrs. J. W. Edgar, who came across the plains to Oregon in 1865, and who has lived in Polk county practically all of the time since that date, died at the home of her son, F. M. Edgar, here yesterday. Death occurred at 1 p. m.

Mrs. Edgar was born in Indiana, August 25, 1845. She moved to Missouri at an early age, remaining there until after her marriage, when she and her husband moved to Oregon. They made their home at Oak Grove, Polk county, for a number of years. Her husband died there last December, and since that time she had been staying with her son here. She leaves the following children:
