

EXTRA BASE HITS GIVE SALEM EASY WIN OVER ALBANY

The Salem high school baseball team took the Albany nine into camp yesterday afternoon on the Albany grounds by an 8 to 1 score. The locals only gathered seven hits off of the delivery of the two Albany hurlers but three of them were for extra bases and came with men on base. Both teams made about six errors.

Kelly was out of the game on account of an injury to his hand and Paul Girod was behind the bat with Adams on second in Girod's place. Adams made a couple of errors but played a good game and got two singles. Coleman Rodgers at first was the star fumbler with four errors to his credit. Most of them were made on throws which were in his hands but he failed to hold them. He seemed to be afraid to get off of his feet.

The red and black nine scored their tallies in the second, third, fourth, sixth and ninth. The Albany team got their lone tally in the eighth frame when the locals made two straight errors. Fabry, for the locals, hurled a stellar game, fanning eleven men and allowing only six scattered hits.

Cotter Gould, who starred at the bat last year but who has failed to connect with the apple this year, got a home run in the second. A ground ruling made before the game let the man who hit the ball over the canvas fence allowed the man a home run. The batter was also allowed to go home if the ball rolled under the fence. Gould's ball hit the ground and rolled under.

COLORADO STORM TAKES 3 LIVES

Denver, Colo., May 22.—A trail of debris, 75 miles long remained in eastern Colorado today as a reminder of the high wind storm which tore through a dozen villages late yesterday, killing three persons, severely injuring three others and causing thousands of dollars damage to property.

At Boulder, Loren H. Bennett, a carpenter, was killed when a roof on which he was working was blown against a mass of rocks. Two others working on the roof escaped with injuries. A boy of five was drowned in a small lake at Berthoud when the wind overturned a boat in which he and a companion were playing. A seven-year-old girl was crushed to death at Plattville when an outbuilding was destroyed.

Most of the property loss was to small buildings and to telephone and telegraph lines. The sale lasted for nearly an hour in some places. At Fort Collins it assumed the force of a tornado, but no great damage was reported there.

WAR LOANS MUST BE PAID IN LUMP SUM IS DECREE

Washington, May 22.—The view of this government that its loans to Europe are subject to repayment as a whole and not piecemeal, has been brought into the foreground of the war debt discussion by word from Brussels that Belgium is ready to negotiate a settlement of debts contracted prior to 1919.

Brussels' dispatches saying that the present cabinet desired to base its funding program on the \$202,000,000 borrowed during the war was taken as indication of an effort to distinguish between loans made for prosecution of the war and those for relief and other purposes. Belgium's total debt to the United States is \$485,592,893.

Officials here have not welcomed suggestions from Europe for priority in repayment of the loans

described abroad as war, relief and "political" loans. They hold that the funding proposals might well include all debts, no matter how classified by the borrowers.

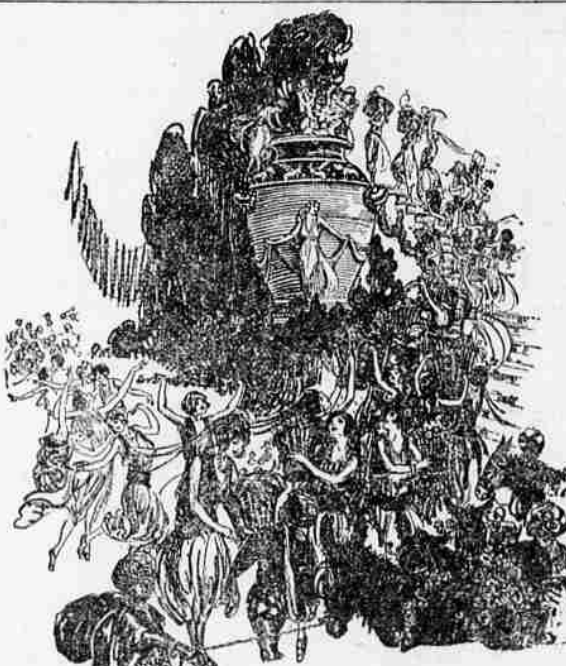

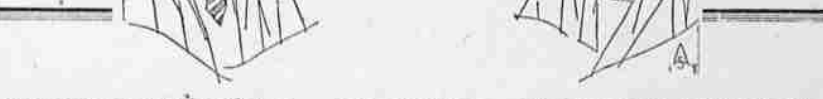
