NEW YORK CHURCH CALLS FOSDICK

New York, May 23.—The Park Avenue Baptist church, the Rockefeller church, after a spirited debate during which a woman objector fainted, ratified the action of the trustees in calling to its pulpit the Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, moderator.

The congregation, by its vote, late last night accepted three conditions laid down by Dr. Fosdick, who for years was the storm center of religious controversy while he occupied a Presbyterian pulpit. Seventeen members out of four hundred present dissented.

Dr. Fosdick's conditions were as follows: That the church no longer insist on baptism by immersion. That its membership be open to all Christians regardless of creed. That the congregation build a skyscraper church near Columbia university with living quarters, club rooms and other institutional features.

WINDOW WASHING PALLS; BANDITRY SHORT LIVED

Los Angeles, Cal., May 23.—Window washing soon wearied Robert Sova, 28, for it seemed to be getting him nowhere. So yesterday he tried robbing a bank, authorities allege, and it got him into the county jail within half an hour after he tried it, all because he unwittingly gave an assistant cashier at the First State bank time enough to step on a bandit alarm button. The alarm aroused the whole block and when the would-be robber ran out the door with \$3400 in currency stuffed in his pockets, a citizen's posse was waiting for him with open arms.

TIDAL WAVE HITS LAKE ON AMERICAN SHORES

Rochester, N. Y., May 23.—A tidal wave along 26 miles of the American shoreline struck Lake Ontario today, causing heavy damage to one village and summer resorts. No loss of life was reported.

The wave rolled in some places more than 150 feet in-shore carrying wreckage and small boats with it.

FRENCH UNABLE TO ROUT RIFFIANS

Rabat, French Morocco, May 23.—(A. P.)—The Riffian tribesmen are standing their ground stoutly against the forces seeking to oust them from the French zone and although General Count De Chambrun's success in Thursday's and Friday's operations is unquestioned, Abd-el-Krim and his followers still loom as formidable foes.

French military men at the headquarters here say the Riffians have shown themselves to be thoroughly organized along the lines developed during the World War and that the French everywhere in Dechambrun's operations captured the enemy's position only by bayonet charges.

The French found that the enemy offered the stiffest resistance and have learned that they can attack the Riffians successfully only after good artillery preparatory exactly as was the practice in the World War.

General Chambrun on the right wing has had especially hard fighting in the recent operations. His men were constantly exposed

to a biting fire and won only at the point of the bayonet. Realizing the difficulties of the campaign the French are reinforcing their advance posts, many of which heretofore have been surrounded and often dangerously threatened.

BONES OF PRE-HISTORIC MAN DECLARED FOUND

Santa Fe, N. M., May 23.—Bones of a human being about 5 feet and a half in stature, about 2000 years old have been unearthed in a mining camp, according to Professor Jayette A. Jones, mining geologist. Jones said the bones were dug from under eight feet of hard, compact cemented clay, unaffected by river deposits. Three successive strata of charcoal a foot or two apart were penetrated before the bones were encountered. Cedar trees, apparently several hundred years old had grown about the bones, Professor Jones said.

Bombay, May 23.—(A. P.)—Three of the nine men charged with the murder in January of Abdul Kadir Bada, rich Mohammedan merchant and protector of Mumtaz Begum, the dancing girl, were sentenced to death today.
