SENATORS HOLD LEAD IN LEAGUE DEFEAT CAMAS

The Salem Senators edged under the wire Sunday afternoon when they defeated the Camas baseball nine at Camas by a score of 5 to 4. They are still leading the interstate league with five wins and no defeats and are likely looking champions although they have several tough clubs to meet yet in Hillsboro and the papermakers. They also have one more game to play with Camas at Salem.

The locals scored four runs in the first inning when the Camas team went up in the air and made four errors. Big Bill Kutt led off after that and kept the Senators eating out of his hand. Neither side scored again until the eighth inning when the Senators' nine scored twice making the score 4 to 2 in favor of the locals. In their half of the ninth with two out the locals scored what proved to be the winning run. "Frisco" Edwards, star receiver of the club came to bat and hit the pill again to first but was only able to make first. Ashby went in to run for him and stole second and went to third on a passed ball. Wayne Barham,

pitcher for the Senators won his own game when he rattled the boards and scored Ashby with the winning run.

Camas came to bat in the ninth with the score 5 to 2 against them and staged a rally that almost won the game for them. The first two men up laid a nice hunt which Barham was unable to field perfectly on account of his bad ankle. The Camas also had a man on first and second with no outs. They both advanced on a passed ball and the Camas crowd nearly went crazy. Barham tightened up and whiffed the next man. The next Camas batter hit the ball against the fence and scored the two runners. On the throw in as "Frisco" went to take it he lost his balance and fell and the ball went clear through and the man went to third. With the tying run on third and one man out Barham fanned the next man, Eldon Jenae, star athlete for the University of Washington team who is starting in centerfield for Camas come to bat. He had made three hits before. He hit a hard liner to Keene which Keene was only able to gather in after jumping several feet into the air. Keene has been having a little trouble with his mitt and he had cut all of the padding out of it leaving the bare skin to sting through. The ball stuck in this hole for the final out. Next week the locals will meet the Vancouver nine on the local diamond.
