

EUGENE MAKES WATER FILING ON MCKENZIE

The city of Eugene has filed with the state engineering department an application for authority to appropriate water from the McKenzie river for the development of 17,454 horsepower at the end of a canal and 10,795 horsepower at a dam in Lane county, also the appropriation of water from the McKenzie for a municipal water supply at Eugene at a cost of \$375,000.

Henry T. Hill of La Grande has filed an application for authority to construct the Grande Ronde lake reservoir for the storage of 20,000 acre feet of water from the Grande Ronde river for irrigation and municipal purposes in Union county at an estimated cost of \$150,000.

E. B. Horton of Bull Run, water from tail race of A. D. Gardner mill ditch from North Santiam river for irrigation of 60 acres in Marion county.

P. R. Price of Roseburg, water from Deer creek for irrigation of one acre and development of eight horsepower in Douglas county, at a cost of \$1000.

Phil J. Kelzer and James Wages of North Bend, water from Haywood creek for municipal supply for North Bend and for trout pond and hatchery in Coos county.

Rock & Gate Creek Ditch company of The Dalles, water from Gate and Rock creeks for irrigation of 10 acres in Waiilatpe county, and also for the appropriation of additional water from Gate and Rock creeks for irrigation of 108 acres, at a cost of \$700.
