## SEEK TO REMOVE NAMES FROM BUS TAX REFERENDUM

A new problem relative to referendum petitions confronts Secretary of State Koster, and has been put up to the attorney general for solution. This is whether names signed to referendum petitions filed with the secretary of state can be withdrawn by him at the request of the signers. Yesterday he received about 200 postal cards requesting that names be withdrawn from the referendum petitions for the bus bill when these are filed in his office.

The attempted withdrawals were inspired, it is said, by the association of county judges and commissioners, who are bitterly fighting the referendum and who sent forth postcards to several thousand signers of the petitions requesting that they sign them and send them to the secretary of state.

### FOREST PATROL TO START JULY 1

San Francisco, May 26.—Headquarters of the United States Forest service here announced today that an airplane fire patrol is to be established for California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana on July 1 and will continue throughout the summer and fall fire season.

Five bases will be established, one each in northern and southern California, one in Oregon, one in Washington and one in either eastern Washington, northern Idaho or western Montana. Eighteen air planes will be used. Santa Monica will be the base in southern California. Some of the other bases have been selected as yet.

The pilots will be recruited from the officers of the army reserve corps but the mechanics will be from the enlisted forces for the most part.

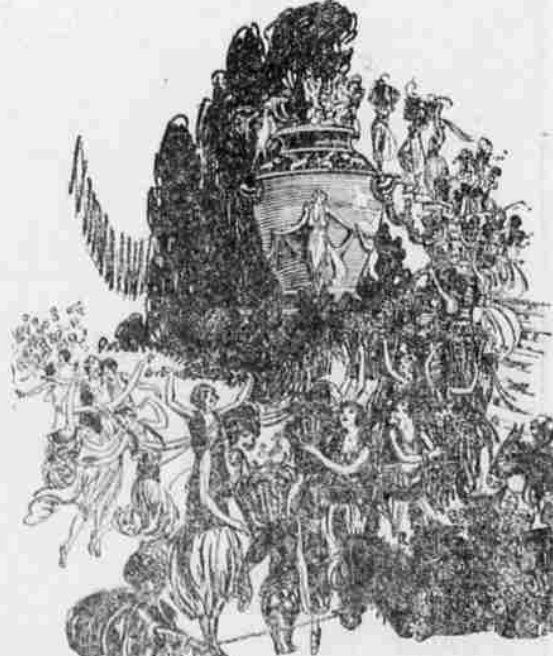
