Salem to Be Represented Marshfield

According to plans being formulated at the present time Salem will be well represented at the twenty fifth annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs which will open in Marshfield next Monday. One of the most interesting programs ever arranged for a federation convention has been announced by the program committee. Information given out by the registration committee at Marshfield points to one of the largest conventions in history of the state organization.

One of the most interesting and attractive musical concerts of the entire year was given last night in the First Christian church when nearly a hundred boys, members of the Salem Boys' chorus, appeared on the platform. Dr. H. C. Epley, director of the chorus, has taken the fresh young voices and trained them and moulded them into a whole that emits entrancing harmonies and pictures in sound.

Gale Dalton, Portland boy soprano, is truly described as second only to the famous Bobby Murray, in the opinion of those who heard him in last night's concert. As accompanying soloist Gale sang several numbers. Equally enjoyable was the solo work of Glen and Donald Woodry, Fred Erick Wolfe, and the pianists Mrs. F. N. Woodry and Robert Alexander. Stanley King pleased the audience, with several readings.

Program opened with ensemble singing of Dr. Epley's arrangement of "Our Salvation." Another chorus number, "Dancing O'er the Waves" followed. Variety was inserted with the "Kid-die special" given by Irwin Pöter and Robert Brown. Robert also played a harp number which was well received.

Flowers, lattice work, and colored lights made a charming background for the small chaps each of whom wore a white blouse and a red tie.

Salem friends of Miss Marian Emmons who is studying at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago will be interested in hearing of honors which she has won recently. 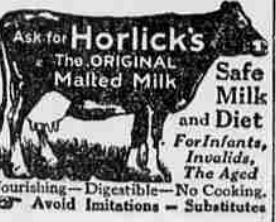
