INDIAN SCHOOL COMMENCEMENT TO OPEN SUNDAY

Chemawa, May 28.—Plans for the commencement week exercises to be held at the school are completed according to Harold Hall, superintendent of the school. The program is exceptionally good this year and they are expecting a record breaking crowd for the exercises which will be given in the school auditorium two evenings. Last year many of the Salem people turned away and it might be advisable for them to get there early as none of the seats are reserved, the first three first secured.

Sunday will start the week's festivities with a competitive military drill for the boys and a physical education exercises for girls, followed by a dress parade in which the student body will participate. The military drill will start at 2:30.

Monday and Tuesday evenings the operetta which is given by the graduating class, although not all of them in the cast are graduates, will be presented. Both evenings will be for the public and are free of charge.

The operetta "Paul Revere" in three acts, by Dodge, will be given. The operetta tells of the famous hero who awoke the patriots at Lexington. The plot, in brief, concerns the coming of Concord, Massachusetts, or Paul Revere, a young goldsmith from Boston. He visits a family friend, John Faxon, and falls in love with the latter's daughter, Captain Marks of the British army also loves Molly and interrupts the love affair between the girl and Paul Revere by informing her father that Paul is a patriot. The father is a King's man and orders Paul from the house. Then comes the famous ride of Revere. The last act is eight years later, after the war for independence had been won, Paul Revere returns to Concord to claim Molly for his bride. The play will start at 8 p. m., both evenings.

Thursday, June 4th, industrial demonstrations for the visitors from 2 to 4. Several other things of interest for the visitors will be a feature of the commencement. Society and class programs will also be given in the afternoon. A ball game will also be played.

SALEM-DALLAS TRAIN SERVICE TO BE CANCELLED

Dallas, Or., May 28.—Direct train connections between Dallas and Salem will be discontinued June 1, according to word received Wednesday by J. M. Campbell, agent. Service will be maintained by motor between Dallas and Gardiner, connecting with the red electric Portland-Corvallis trains, with the exception that the train now leaving Dallas at 7 a. m. will leave at 10 a. m.

Stages will make connections at Derry with all trains not served by the motor.

The change will effect the outgoing Dallas mail, but Postmaster Coad has not yet received notice from the department as to changes. It is possible that arrangements will be made for the mail to carry Dallas-Salem mail. Otherwise all Dallas to Salem mail will probably have to be routed via Corvallis.

RIFFS RECRUIT NATIVE FORCES

Paris, May 28.—(By Associated Press)—Abd-el-Krim, the Riffian leader is actively recruiting supporters among the tribesmen inhabiting the zone north of the Ouergha river, which has just been abandoned by the French.

Hard fighting is continuing with neither side making an appreciable gain.

Information from sources which the French consider unimpeachable is to the effect that 147 young Germans, trained in various semi-military athletic organizations, have left Germany for Morocco by way of Spain to join Abd-el-Krim's troops.

Some, it is said, will receive commissions, while the others will serve as non-commissioned officers.

POLK HAS FIRST FIRE OF SEASON ON LUCKIAMUTE

Dallas, Or., May 28.—The first fire of the 1925 season was reported Tuesday afternoon from Polk's camp on the Valley & Silette line on the Luckiamute. It originated from the burning of slashings.

Reports reaching here indicated that some of the equipment was damaged by the blaze and that two or three of the crew at the camp had been overcome while fighting it.

The camp superintendent, however, minimized the damage in a telephone conversation Wednesday. It was indicated that the slashing of the company was still burning and that no check could be made on the damage as yet.

The fire was under control, he said. Unless weather conditions force it beyond control there is little danger of serious damage.

The present fire season has been much less disastrous than 1924. Just a year ago the Willamette Valley Lumber company suffered severe losses in the woods when fire took its camp, log dump and burned several trestles.

BATTLESHIP OREGON WILL ARRIVE JUNE 15

REFERENDUM ON TITHING BILL IN

Just before midnight last night completed petitions for the referendum of the tithing bill were filed with Secretary of State Kasper, who on the last day allowed by law for filing referendum petitions, kept his office open after 5 o'clock to receive them. The petitions contain 9250 certified names.

The filing of the tithing bill petitions, that measure, the bus bill and the tobacco tax bill are all held in abeyance pending the outcome of the general election in November, 1926. The tithing act is designed to require all self-sustaining state institutions to pay into the general fund of the state 10 per cent of their annual revenues. It was one of the state's financial program measures.
