Program at Luncheon Interesting

The early history of Salem, of Silverton, and of Aurora was related in an extremely interesting manner before the group of matrons, members of the national league of women voters, who gathered at luncheon in the Marion hotel yesterday. The program arranged for the final meeting of the club year of the league came as a climax to the study of the "Know Your Town" series which has concerned members of study groups during the winter months.

More than thirty league members, or those interested in its work, sat about the luncheon table yesterday when Mrs. Rex Sanford read a comprehensive paper on Salem's early history beginning with the coming of the first mission: Rev. Jason Lee, his nephew Rev. Daniel Lee and two laymen, Cyrus Shepard and P. L. Edwards, to the northwest in September, 1834. This opened the "civilized" history of the valley. Then followed the description of the early struggles of the missionaries, the gradual influx of settlers, good farming stock, Mrs. Sanford's paper showed the results of much research for the names of the old pioneer families—White, Beer, Wilson, Downing, Johnson, Waller, Hines, Parrish, Forrest, Raymond, Babcock, Brewer, Abernethy—were all given with historic accuracy. The moving of the old townsite from the present location of the city of Salem, the changing of the name from Chemeketa to Salem, the location of the first mission down near the old lannery, the building of the "old university" on the present Willamette campus site in 1842, the early days of the "Oregon Institute," the surveying of the present site of the city by Dr. W. H. Wilson in 1845, the removal of the state capitol from Oregon City to Salem in 1851, the first session of the legislature of the Oregon territory in 1851-52, the first stage line from Marysville (now Corvallis) to Chamboog in 1852, the state agricultural society fairs beginning in 1854—the fore runners of the present state fairs—all these facts and many more interwoven in Mrs. Sanford's story of early Salem made it a most valuable contribution.

The early history of Silverton was aptly and interestingly told by Mrs. C. W. Keene. Many of the facts were obtained by Mrs. Keene from Robert H. Downs' history which was recently published. Aurora early days were described equally as aptly by Mrs. John W. Saffler, the three papers together giving almost a complete record of Marion county pioneer period.

A special guest at the luncheon yesterday was Miss Hester Hollingshead, regional secretary of the league and founder of the Salem branch. Miss Hollingshead gave an interesting report of the national convention which she attended in Richmond, Virginia. Among the outstanding topics of discussion at the convention, said Miss Hollingshead, were the child labor amendment and international cooperation for the prevention of war; the program of work for the year was adopted, and during a board meeting it was decided that next year the national organization will send speakers of national reputation to the seventh region—which includes Salem. Miss Hollingshead told of the presence of the new voters section at the conference—the inspiration which the older women gained in meeting the "new voters" seventy calling girls from thirty two different colleges in eleven states. The local branch of the league will again resume activities with the beginning of the fall season.

Miss Florence Cartwright will be hostess in her home tonight at a dancing party honoring Miss Lois Wheeler who has returned recently from school in California. More than a dozen couples have been hidden to the affair.

H. P. Irvine, editor of the Oregon Journal, will speak of "The American Home," the chairman of that department in the federation, Mrs. Jessie D. McComb of Corvallis, presiding. Dr. Jonah H.
