## POWER PLANT AT FALLS CITY SOLD

Dallas, Or., May 28.—An offer of the Mountain States Power company on the Falls City municipal electric plant was approved Tuesday night by the Falls City council. The offer was \$19,000, \$1000 more than was at first offered when the council declined to approve.

In order to sell the plant the voters of the city must approve and this will call for a special election some time in the near future. Twenty days' notice is necessary for the calling of such an election.

In case the sale is made it will be necessary to rebuild the entire distributing system and to construct a transmission line from Dallas to Falls City. This would benefit the farmers living near the route taken by the line as it would allow an economical tie up for lights and power.

It is probable that the present Falls City power plant would not be used. The electric service in Falls City is now a night service only and does not furnish satisfactory power. All day service would be maintained if the sale is made and a schedule of rates adopted uniform with Dallas and Independence.
